This fun Father's Day favor box is filled with personlized fish that have individual coupons to be cashed in by dad when he chooses. Kids can come up with their own coupons like; a big hug, taking out the trash, doing the dishes, walking the dog just to name a few. This kids craft makes a fun and special Father's Day gift for dad!

What you'll need:

- Empty round container (ie: Crunchies can, Nut can, etc.)
- Construction paper (variety of colors)
- Crayons
- Pen
- · Googly eyes
- Tape
- Glue
- Scissors

How to make your Father's Day Coupon Box:

• Cut out a strip of blue construction paper and tape or glue it to the container. (We found that

a single sheet wasn't big enough for our container and taped two pieces of paper together first and then cut out our strip.)


- Cut out a wavy, thinner strip of brown construction paper to glue to the bottom of the container (the whole way around) to look like sand at the bottom of the ocean.
- Add construction paper decorations or use crayons and have your kids draw on fish, seaweed, etc.
- Use a crayon to write "Happy Father's Day" on your fish container.
- Cut out fish from construction paper. Add a googly eye and a smile to each fish
- On each fish, write something special (a chore or activity) that the child could do for dad. Ideas for young children would be things like "give dad a hug" or "bring dad a snack" whereas older children could write things like "take out the trash" or "mow the lawn". Have your children help you come up with the ideas to make the gift even more special!
- Place the fish in the container and put the lid on top.

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COVENANT CORNER

Thinking about getting a Storage Shed? There are specific guidelines regarding sheds. You want to make sure you have approval prior to installing it. The plastic tuff sheds are not approved. Typically the only sheds that are approved are wood. The shingles have to match the shingles on the home and the trim needs to be painted to match the trim on the home as well.

To obtain an Architectural Control Committee form, please visit the HOA website at www.woodlandspringhoa.com or call the onsite office at 817-741-1719.

Here is what the CC&R's have to say about Accessory Structures and sheds:

5.3.7 Accessory Structures. Without the prior written approval of the ACC, accessory strucit or to remove it.

Except for children's playhouses, dog houses, greenhouses, gaze-

tures - such as dog houses, gazebos, , playhouses, greenhouses, pergolas, workshops, backyard kitchens and tornado shelters are prohibited (not allowed) if (1) they exceed the height of a fence, or (2) are visible from a street or common area, or (3) are visible by a person standing on the surface of an adjoining lot. Accessory structures may not be located in front yards or in unfenced portions of side yards facing streets. If an accessory structure is installed in violation of this Section, the ACC reserves the right to determine that the accessory structure is unattractive or inappropriate or otherwise unsuitable for the Property, and may require the owner to screen



bos and buildings for storage of lawn maintenance equipment, no building previously constructed elsewhere shall be moved onto any Lot, it being the intention that only new construction be placed and erected thereon.

GET ACC APPROVAL BEFORE YOU SHOP FOR A STORAGE SHED 5.3.8


Storage Sheds.Detached storage sheds shall be allowed on the property with the following conditions:

- a. Shed shall be no larger than 10' x 8'.
- b. Shed shall be no taller than 9' 0" as measured from the ground.
- c. Shed shall not be visible from the street immediately in front of the lot on which the shed is locat-

- ed. Additional review and consideration will be given to corner Lots to assess visibility of sheds from the side streets.
- d. Shed shall be situated behind the wooden privacy fence.
- e. Shed shall be painted to match the trim color of the house.
- f. Shed shall have a roof shingle similar to the roof shingle on the house.

These conditions are a guide for review by the Architectural Control Committee (ACC).

The ACC may grant variance from these conditions or impose additional restriction(s) on a case-by-case basis.

Each person that knocks on your door to solicit a product for sale must have on his or her person a copy of the permit from the city to engage in door to door sales activity. There are several reasons for this permit request and they are all geared to keep homeowners from being victims of crime and to protect our child from sex predators. All these people go through background checks by the department to

ensure that their businesses are legitimate and that there are no wanted individual or child sex predators roaming the neighborhoods. Now, understand that it is not a violation of the law if they are passing out handbills (fliers on your door), unless you have posted in plain and reasonable view a "No Trespass or No Soliciting". If these signs posted then the individual is in violation of the criminal trespass laws. I have attached a link that will assist you with any city ordinance interest you may have. 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Father's Day



Father's Day was inaugurated in the United States in the early 20th century to complement Mother's Day in celebrating fatherhood and male parenting.

In 1910, a Father's Day celebration was held in Spokane, Washington, at the YMCA by Sonora Smart Dodd, who was born in Arkansas. Its first celebration was in the Spokane YMCA on June 19, 1910. Her father, the Civil War veteran William Jackson Smart, was a single parent who raised his six children there. After hearing a sermon about Jarvis' Mother's Day in 1909 at Central Methodist Episcopal Church, she told her pastor that fathers should have a similar holiday honoring them. Although she initially suggested June 5, her father's birthday, the pastors did not have enough time to prepare their sermons, and the celebration was deferred to the third Sunday of June. Several local clergymen accepted the idea, and on 19 June 1910, the first Father's Day, "sermons honoring fathers were presented throughout the city."

However, in the 1920s, Dodd stopped promoting the celebration because she was studying in the Art Institute of Chicago, and it faded into relative obscurity, even in Spokane. In the 1930s, Dodd returned to Spokane and started promoting the celebration again, raising awareness at a national level. She had the help of those trade groups that would benefit most from the holiday, for example the manufacturers of ties, tobacco pipes, and any traditional present to fathers. By 1938 she had the help of the Father's Day Council, founded by the New York Associated Men's

Wear Retailers to consolidate and systematize the commercial promotion. Americans resisted the holiday for its first few decades, viewing it as nothing more than an attempt by merchants to replicate the commercial success of Mother's Day, and newspapers frequently featured cynical and sarcastic attacks and jokes. However, said merchants remained resilient and even incorporated these attacks into their advertisements. By the mid-1980s, the Father's Council wrote that "(...) [Father's Day] has become a Second Christmas for all the men's gift-oriented industries."

A bill to accord national recognition of the holiday was introduced in Congress in 1913. In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson went to Spokane to speak in a Father's Day celebration and wanted to make it official, but Congress resisted, fearing that it would become commercialized. US President Calvin Coolidge recommended in 1924 that the day be observed by the nation, but stopped short of issuing a national proclamation. Two earlier attempts to formally recognize the holiday had been defeated by Congress. In 1957, Maine Senator Margaret Chase Smith wrote a proposal accusing Congress of ignoring fathers for 40 years while honoring mothers, thus "[singling] out just one of our two parents". In 1966, President Lyndon B. Johnson issued the first presidential proclamation honoring fathers, designating the third Sunday in June as Father's Day. Six years later, the day was made a permanent national holiday when President Richard Nixon signed it into law in 1972.

In addition to Father's Day, International Men's Day is celebrated in many countries on November 19 for men and boys who are not fathers.

Failed attempts at establishing a Father's Day After the success obtained by Anna Jarvis with the promotion of Mother's Day in Grafton, West Virginia, the first observance of a "Father's Day" was held on July 5, 1908, in Fairmont, West Virginia, in the Williams Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church South, now known as Central United Methodist Church. Grace Golden Clayton was mourning the loss of her father when, on December 1907, the Monongah Mining Disaster in nearby Monongah killed 361 men, 250 of them fathers, leaving around a thousand fatherless children. Clayton suggested her pastor Robert Thomas Webb to honor all those fathers.

Clayton's event did not have repercussions outside of Fairmont for several reasons, among them: the city was overwhelmed by other events, the celebration was never promoted outside of the town itself and no proclamation was made in the City Council. Also two events overshadowed this event: the celebration of Independence Day July 4, 1908, with 12,000 attendants and several shows including a hot air balloon event, which took over the headlines in the following days, and the death of a 16-year-old girl on July 4. The local church and Council were overwhelmed





and they did not even think of promoting the event, and it was not celebrated again for many years. The original sermon was not reproduced in press and it was lost. Finally, Clayton was a quiet person, who never promoted the event or even talked to other persons about it.

Clayton also may have been inspired by Anna Jarvis' crusade to establish Mother's Day; two months prior, Jarvis had held a celebration for her dead mother in Grafton, West Virginia, a town about 15 miles (24 km) away from Fairmont.

In 1911, Jane Addams proposed a city-wide Father's Day in Chicago, but she was turned down.

In 1912, there was a Father's Day celebration in Vancouver, Washington, suggested by Methodist pastor J. J. Berringer of the Irvingtom Methodist Church. They believed mistakenly that they had been the first to celebrate such a day. They followed a 1911 suggestion by the Portland Oregonian.

Harry C. Meek, member of Lions Clubs International, claimed that he had first the idea for Father's Day in 1915. Meek claimed that the third Sunday of June was chosen because it was his birthday (it would have been more natural to choose his father's birthday). The Lions Club has named him "Originator of Father's Day". Meek made many efforts to promote Father's Day and make it an official holiday.



Everything you need to know to keep your kids safe when swimming.

There Is No Substitute for Active Supervision

- Actively supervise children in and around open bodies of water, giving them your undivided attention.
- Whenever infants or toddlers are in or around water, an adult should be within arm's reach to provide active supervision. We know it's hard to get everything done without a little multitasking, but this is the time to avoid distractions of any kind. If children are near water, then they should be the only thing on your mind. Small children can drown in as little as one inch of water.
- When there are several adults present and children are swimming, use the Water Watcher card strategy, which designates an adult as the Water Watcher for a certain amount of time (such as 15-minute periods) to prevent lapses in supervision. Download a Water Watcher card here.

Start Slow With Babies

• You can start introducing your babies to water when they are about 6 months old. Remember to always use waterproof diapers and change them frequently.

Educate Your Kids About Swimming Safely

- Every child is different, so enroll children in swimming lessons when you feel they are ready. Teach children how to tread water, float and stay by the shore.
- Make sure kids swim only in areas designated for swimming. Teach children that swimming in open water is not the same as swimming in a pool. They need to be aware of uneven surfaces, river currents, ocean undertow and changing weather.
- Whether you're swimming in a backyard pool or in a lake, teach children to swim with a partner, every time. From the start, teach children to never go near or in water without an adult present.

Drowning is the leading cause of injury-related death among children ages 1-4.

Don't Rely on Swimming Aids

• Remember that swimming aids such as water wings or noodles are fun toys

for kids, but they should never be usedin place of a U.S. Coast Guard-approved personal flotation device (PFD).

Take the Time to Learn CPR

- We know you have a million things to do, but learning CPR should be on the top of the list. It will give you tremendous peace of mind and the more peace of mind you have as a parent, the better. Local hospitals, fire departments and recreation departments offer CPR training.
- Have your children learn CPR. It's a skill that will serve them for a lifetime.

Take Extra Steps Around Pools

- A swimming pool is a ton of fun for you and your kids. Make sure backyard pools have four-sided fencing that's at least 4 feet high and a self-closing, self-latching gate to prevent a child from wandering into the pool area unsupervised.
- When using inflatable or portable pools, remember to empty them immediately after use. Store them upside down and out of children's reach.
- Install a door alarm, a window alarm or both to alert you if a child wanders into the pool area unsupervised.

Check the Drains in Your Pool and Spa

• Educate your children about the dangers of drain entanglement and entrap-

- ment and teach them to never play or swim near drains or suction outlets.
- Pools that pose the greatest risk of entrapment are children's public wading pools, in-ground hot tubs, or any other pools that have flat drain grates or a single main drain system.
- For new pools or hot tubs, install multiple drains in all pools, spas, whirl-pools and hot tubs. This minimizes the suction of any one drain, reducing risk of death or injury. If you do have drains, protective measures include anti-entrapment drain covers and a safety vacuum release system to automatically release suction and shut down the pump should entrapment occur.
- Regularly check to make sure drain covers are secure and have no cracks, and replace flat drain covers with dome-shaped ones. If a pool or hot tub has a broken, loose or missing drain cover, don'tuse it.
- If you do have drains, protective measures include anti-entrapment drain covers and a safety vacuum release system to automatically release suction and shut down the pump should entrapment occur. Go to www.Pool-Safety.gov for a list of manufacturers of certified covers.
- Check to make sure your pool or hot tub's drains are compliant with the Pool and Spa Safety Act.

You are not allowed to put any plastic in the BLUE trash bin unless it # 1-7 in the Triangle Symbol? Plastic grocery bags are not recyclable.

You are not allowed to recycle Styrofoam in any form? (No packing peanuts)

Plastic trash bags outside of the BROWN trash bin will not be picked up unless they are City of Fort Worth issued bags? You may purchase and be charged for bags on your FW Water bill.

Trash placed in plastic trash bags for Large Trash Pick Up will not be picked up?

Trash must be exposed, left at the curb or in open boxes.

Greeting cards and wrapping paper are NOT recyclable and neither are household cleaning bottles?

You can be fined if your bin is audited and they find the wrong items in your BLUE cart?

If you have a broken lid you can call 817 392-1234 for a replacement?

All your carts MUST be removed from the curb by midnight on the day of your trash pickup or you can be fined?

All your carts MUST be stored out of sight from street view?



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Woodland Springs Homeowner's Association

The purpose of a homeowners association (HOA) is to maintain, enhance and protect the common areas and interests of the subdivision or neighborhood. Individual homeowners, as members of the association, pay periodic assessments support & utilize neighborhood amenities (pond, pools, parks, tennis courts, etc.). The assessments pay for community expenses such as entrance monuments, landscaping, amenities like clubhouses, tennis courts, or walking trails, insurance for commonlyowned structures and areas, an on-site management company, or any other item delineated in the governing documents or agreed to by the homeowners' association.

Currently, the Advisory Committee, which is comprised of elected residents, is the intermediate group between the residents and the Board of Directors and Centurion American (VOWS developer).
