Red White and Blue Strawberry Shortcake

Ingredients

- Original recipe makes 1 9x13-inch cake
- 1 (18.25 ounce) package yellow cake mix
- 1 (8 ounce) container frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 1 pint Blueberries, rinsed and drained
- 1 pints Fresh Strawberries, rinsed and sliced

Directions

1. Prepare cake according to package directions and bake in a 9X13 inch pan. Cool completely.

2. Frost cake with whipped topping. Place blueberries in a square in the corner, and arrange sliced strawberries as stripes to make an American Flag. Chill until serving.







COVENANT CORNER

Garbage

For items that are too large, heavy or bulky to fit into the brown garbage cart, curbside collection is made monthly.

• All garbage must be contained in garbage bags within the brown cart.

The lid must be completely closed.Overstuffed carts will not be picked up.

• Bags left outside the cart will not be picked up (except city-issued "Pay Bags").

• The cart must be at the curb by 7 a.m. on your pickup day.

• You may set out your cart after 6 p.m. the night before your pickup day.

• Place cart so that the handle faces your house and the serial number faces the street.

• Place cart a few inches from the curb or edge of the street; do not place cart in street.

• Retrieve cart from curb by midnight on your pickup day.

• City ordinance requires residents to store carts so they can't be seen from a public street while standing in front of the house.

Bulk Trash

Fort Worth provides monthly curbside collection at residential homes of items that are too large, heavy or bulky to fit in the brown garbage cart for normal garbage pickup.

The following items should not be set out as part of bulky item collection:

• No trash, garbage, rubbish, waste or any material of any kind in plastic bags

• No leaves, grass or other yard trimmings in plastic bags. These items should be set out in paper yard bags for weekly yard trimmings and brush collection.

• No automobile parts, batteries or tires (residents can dispose of four tires every six months at city drop-off stations)

• No contractor remodeling and demolition debris such as shingles, wallboard and lumber

• No electronic equipment such as computers (use the city drop-off stations)

• No household appliances that contain coolant, gasoline or other chemicals, including air conditioners, refrigerators and lawnmowers (accepted at city drop-off stations)

• No dirt, rocks, concrete or ceramic tile

No liquids, poisons or explosives

How much can you set out?

Bulky item pick-up is limited to 10 cubic yards (about eight feet long, six feet wide and six feet tall) at no extra charge to each household that receives curbside garbage and recycling collection. There is an extra charge for piles exceeding 10 cubic yards.

When do you put items at the curb?

Place bulky items on the curb by 7 a.m. Monday of your assigned week. You may place items on the curb as early as 6 p.m. the Friday before your assigned week. Crews have until the following Saturday at 5 p.m. to pick up bulky items. After crews have collected on your street, do not place more bulky items on the curb until the next month on your designated week.

Yard Trimmings

Yard trimmings and brush are collected separately from garbage so that they can be taken to a facility where they're turned into mulch —instead of depositing them at a landfill and wasting valuable natural resources.

Getting rid of yard trimmings and brush weekly:

Bag it - Place leaves, grass clippings and other small trimmings in Paper Yard Bags purchased at grocery stores, hardware and garden stores. Roll the paper yard bag top closed; don't staple or tape to close. There is no limit on the number of paper bags you may set out.

Bundle it - Use string or twine to bundle shrub and tree trimmings. Bundles should be no more than four feet in length and weigh no more than 40 pounds. People, not machines pick these up by hand. There is no limit on the number of tied bundles you may set out.

Stack it - Individual tree and shrub limbs up to eight feet long and four inches in diameter can be stacked at the curb on your weekly pickup day. No plastic bags, garbage, bulky items, stumps or root balls are accepted in brush piles. Root balls and stumps (maximum 18" diameter) may be placed in the bulky items pile. To avoid collection charges, make sure piles do not exceed 10 cubic yards.

Cart it - Use the optional 96-gallon green yard cart, available for \$75 by calling the city's customer service center (817-392-1234). The one-time fee is charged on your water bill, but

there is no additional monthly charge for the cart.

Drop it off - You may also take brush to a City drop-off station to avoid extra pickup fees.

Metal Containers

Please rinse. Labels can be left on. Aluminum drink cans - do not flat-

- ten
 - Aluminum baking tins durable type, not disposable
- Pots and pans
- Steel or tin food cans and lids
- Empty aerosol cans with spray nozzle; remove plastic lid unless part of the can
- Empty steel paint cans no liquids please. A thin skin of dry paint on bottom and sides is OK; remove and recycle the lid
- **Glass Containers**
- Please rinse. Labels can be left on. All colors accepted.
- Bottles and jars remove metal and plastic lids and recycle
- Ceramics
- China
- Dishes

- Mirrors must fit inside cart with lid closed
- Windowpanes no auto glass

Plastic Containers

Please rinse. All colors accepted. Containers must be hard plastic.

- · Bottles, cups and jars rigid plastic containers with No. 1 through No. 7 recycling symbols on bottom of container.
- · Food trays, tubs and bowls with no styrofoam - with No. 1 through No. 7 recycling symbols on bottom of container
- Plastic eating utensils

Do not put these in the blue cart The following is not an exhaustive list of items that should not be recyclable. If still unsure, dispose of items in the garbage cart instead of attempting to recycle.

- Aluminum foil
- Auto glass
 - Clothing or bedding
- Compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs)*
- Drink boxes and straws
- Food scraps or items that contain food
- Fluorescent light bulbs*
- Garden hoses
- Gift wrap and greeting cards

- Hangers (all types)
- Light bulbs
- Medical waste
- Plastic containers that held hazardous materials such as gasoline, motor oil, paint, pesticide or weed killer.
- Plastic bags including grocery sacks, dry cleaning bags, newspaper sleeves
- Toys
- Styrofoam® cups, food containers, packing, "peanuts", etc.
- Waxed paper and waxed food containers
- Yard trimmings (set out as yard waste, separate from the recycling cart. Yard waste will go to a separate processing facility).

Other ways to recycle in Fort Worth

Take your recycling to the next level by composting. Visit the Compost Outpost to learn more.

Some items listed can be recycled at locations throughout the City. For example, plastic shopping bags can be returned to most grocery stores and many retail stores.



5 FUN FACTS ABOUT THE FOURTH OF JULY

The Fourth of July, or Independence Day, celebrates the anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. It's a national holiday, celebrated with everything from flag raising ceremonies to backyard barbecues and fireworks. To celebrate our nation's birthday, here are a few fun facts you may not have known about the 4th of July and American history.

5 Fun 4th of July Facts:

1. What animal did Benjamin Franklin supposedly prefer as the official national bird over the bald eagle?

Benjamin Franklin is said to have wanted the wild turkey to be the national bird but was outvoted by both John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, who chose the bald eagle, a bird of prey native only to North America, as the official bird of the United States of America.

2. How many hot dogs are consumed, on average, at barbecues on the Fourth?

The 4th of July and barbecues go hand-in-hand, so it's probably no surprise that over an estimated 150 million hot dogs are consumed in the United States each Independence Day. Break that down, and that's roughly one hot dog for every two people in the U.S.





3. What year was the 4th of July first celebrated at the White House?

The first recorded 4th of July celebrations were in 1777 on the one-year anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence. The first 4th of July party held at the White House, however, wasn't until 1801, when it was held by President Thomas Jefferson.

4. Why were the stars on the original American flag arranged in a circle?

The 13 stars on the American flag were arranged in a circle to represent equality between the original thirteen colonies. Although there were several versions of the early flag, including one with the stars arranged in vertical lines, the "Betsy Ross flag," which depicts the stars in a circle, was the most popular.

5. When was the 4th of July declared a national holiday?

Although the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence has been celebrated since 1777, the 4th of July was not declared a national holiday until 1941. The 4th of July wasn't referred to as Independence Day until 1791.


