


All city departments will be using GovDelivery as their mechanism for news and information to residents. No content is going away – it will just look a tad different and be delivered in a new, more convenient format.



# STOP THAT Barkin

Dogs left alone all day get bored and restless, and many find relief in barking. Some respond noisily to any and all activity. But, nothing is as annoying as incessant barking—even for dog lovers. If your dog is a yapper or a yowler, please consider some of these bark-abatement ideas to keep the noise down in your area. Your neighbors will thank you!

- **Training.** Always the first recommendation for any behavioral problem! Help is as close as the Yellow Pages. Training not only helps your dog, you'll be surprised how much it helps you, too. You may get some insight into why your dog barks so much, or what it is trying to communicate.
- Citronella collars. A humane alternative to the electric-shock, anti-barking collar and costs about the same. Available on the web and in pet stores.
- Confinement. Sometimes simply bringing an outspoken dog indoors or confining it to a crate can cut down on the disturbance to neighbors.
- Reduce stimulus. Close drapes to help muffle street noise, or leave a radio on to mask it. Disconnect telephones and doorbells before leaving your home if they upset your dog or make it bark.
- Companionship. Dogs are pack animals; they need companionship—a cat, bird, or another dog. Consider a mid-day visit from a pet-sitting service, or drop your pooch off at a friend's place or a day-care facility once or twice a week.

# CONTROLLING RATS RODENTS



The roof rat is the major problem species in Texas. This agile rat is slender with the tail longer than the head and body. Roof rats frequently enter buildings and move about neighborhoods by using utility lines and fences as runways. The roof rats prefer to feed on many of the fruits, nuts, ivy, and pet food commonly found in residential backyards.

Rats and their fleas are capable of transmitting a variety of human diseases. Among the diseases transmitted by rats, bubonic plague is perhaps the most serious. Marine typhus is another rat-borne disease that exists in certain areas of Southern California. This disease, like plague, can be transmitted by rat fleas.

Roof rat survival and prosperity are dependent upon the existence of these three basic environmental conditions:

- abundance of food
- available source of water
- access to suitable harborage

Good environmental management practices supplemented by the wise use of rodenticides are the most effective approaches to roof rat control program. The homeowner can help control rat populations by doing the following:

- Harvest oranges, avocados, peaches, apricots, plums, walnuts, and tangerines as soon as they ripen. Pick up all fallen fruit.
- Never leave uneated food outside overnight.
- Keep pet food in sealed metal containers if stored in the garage or other outbuildings.
- Keep palm trees and yucca plants well trimmed. Algerian ivy, oleander, bougainvillea, and other thickly matted plants should be periodically thinned and trimmed well away from roofs, walls, fences, utility poles, and trees.
- Store wood and lumber piles on racks at least 18 inches above the ground and 12 inches away from walls. Storage boxes housed in utility sheds should be stacked close together and in an orderly fashion. Clean up debris piles.
- Repair leaky faucets and eliminate any other unnecessary standing water.

Roof rats can enter a home through small exterior openings of less than one inch in diameter. Important steps a homeowner can take to exclude rats are inspecting and repairing:

- windows and ventilation ports
- attic vents and louvers
- gaps between roof and chimney
- vent pipes and shafts
- tile roofs along the eaves

All access openings should be screened with 1/4 inch galvanized hardware cloth and inspected at least once a year for condition. Gaps around pipes and electrical conduit should be sealed, and cracks around doors and windows should be weatherproofed. Tree limbs should be kept away from eaves, roofs and exterior walls of the house.

# Things to Plant IN FEBRUARY







FLOWER PLANTS: African Daisy (Arctotis), Alyssum, Anchusa (Summer Forget-Me-Not), Antirrhinum (Snapdragon), Bellis (English Daisy), Balloon Flower, Butterfly Weed, Calendula, Candytuft, Cornflower, Chrysanthemum, Cornflower, Delphinium, Dianthus, Daisy (African, Michaelmas & Painted), Feverfew, Gaillardia, Larkspur, Liatris, Edging Lobelia, Lobelia (Cardinal Flower), Mimulus (Monkey Flower), Nasturtium, Penstemon, Ornamental Cabbage and Kale, Pansy, Phlox (Drummondii and paniculata), Stock, Viola (Johnny-Jump-Up & Pansy).

FLOWER SEEDS: Alyssum, Calendula, Candytuft, Cosmos,
Flowering Tobacco (Nicotiana), Four O'clock, Gayfeather, Larkspur,
Linaria, Marigold, Monkey Flower, Nasturtium, Penstemon,
Petunia, Phlox (Drummond), Salvia, Stock (Dwarf), Verbena,
Sweet Pea, Sweet William (Dianthus).

BULBS: Agapanthus, Amaryllis (in containers), Allium, Alstroemeria, Amarcrinum, Calla, Canna, Crinum, Dahlia, Daylily, Gladiolus, Hymerocallis (Spider Lily), Liriope, Monkey Grass, Mondo Grass, Rainlily, Society Garlic, Tigridia, Tulip.

VEGETABLES: Early—Mid Month: Asparagus crowns, Broccoli plants, Cabbage plants, Cauliflower plants, Carrots, Chard, Onion bulbs, English and edible pod Peas, Potato (Irish) Spinach.

Mid—Late Month: Mustard. All Month: Beets, Collards, Kohlrabi, Lettuce, Radish, and Turnip.

**HERBS:** Dill, Fennel, Garlic chives, Horseradish, Lemon Balm, Mint, Parsley, Rosemary, Summer Savory.

FRUIT: Bare root or container grown Pecans, Fruit trees, Grapes and Berry bushes.



## The Responsibility of Neighbors and a Fence

The responsibility of neighbors regarding fences may vary by local statutes, personal arrangements, and HOA rules. You want to be on good terms with your neighbor, but sometimes tensions arise when mutual fence issues are viewed differently by each neighbor. When conflicting viewpoints come up, work to find a mutually satisfactory compromise. If a mutual compromise cannot be found, look at the legal ramifications involved to see what your rights and responsibilities are.

If the fence in question is on a property line between your property and your neighbors, both parties have a responsibility for its maintenance and replacement. Discuss with your neighbor what you consider to be the needs and steps to take for the repair before you begin the process. Make a plan that is agreeable to both parties. For example... you could both work on it, or hire a contractor and split the costs. All arrangements and costs should be understood beforehand. Remember, after you have repaired or replaced the fence, it's too late to ask your neighbor to share the costs since you proceeded on your own. Avoid trouble by talking to your neighbor and making joint decisions.

# Do You Know Where Your Association Documents Are?

When you bought a home in our community, you should have received copies of all our governing documents—including the rules and regulations—prior to or at closing. Sometimes these documents get lost among all the other papers you received at closing. And many homebuyers are so involved moving into their new homes, they don't take the time to read all the fine print.

As a homeowner, you have a right to these documents; so, if you don't have copies for any reason, let us know, and we'll provide them to you. Of course, it's your responsibility to provide the association with your current address and phone number (particularly nonresident owners). This enables us meet our obligation to provide all owners with information from the association.

It's very important to have copies of the governing documents because you'll be expected to know and comply with all rules and regulations of the community. You'll also want to stay informed by reading all materials provided by the association.

It's our responsibility to make these documents—the bylaws and the covenants, conditions, and restrictions—as understandable as possible, so if there's anything you don't understand, please let us know. We'll be glad to clarify any confusing language or give you other materials that answer your questions.

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# SUPER BOWL RECIPES

#### BLACK EYED PEA DIP

1- 2oz jar diced pimentos (drained)

1/2 red onion (chopped)

1 cup celery (chopped)

1 red bell pepper (chopped)

3 cans black eyed peas (drained & rinsed)

1 - 4oz can chopped green chili peppers (drained)

Mix all ingredients together.

#### DRESSING:

2/3 cup vinegar 1 tsp seasoned salt 2/3 cup sugar 1/2 tsp black pepper 1/2 cup oil 1 tsp minced fresh garlic

Mix all ingredients together in a large bowl. Pour dressing mixture over salad and mix. Chill overnight, serve with tortilla chips.

### **B-L-T BITES**

16 cherry tomatoes

1lb bacon, cooked & crumbled

1/2 cup mayonnaise

1/3 cup green onion, finely chopped

3 tbsp Parmesan cheese, finely grated

2 tbsp fresh parsley, finely chopped

Cut tops off each tomato. Scoop out and discard pulp, drain. In a small bowl, combine the remaining ingredients. Spoon filling into tomatoes, cover and chill.

# Spring CLEANING



With spring just around the corner, here are a few TIPS to help you prepare in February for your property "Spring Cleaning" in March!

### **SMOKE ALARM**

A working smoke alarm increases your chances of surviving a fire by more than 50%.

- Pass the Test. Just press the red test button with your finger. If the alarm fails to sound, change the battery or replace the alarm.
- Double Your Chances. Smoke alarms can be a love-hate relationship. We love that they can double our chances of surviving a fire, but hate the sound when they go off due to burnt toast. Remember, don't yank the batteries, remove the covers or disable your smoke alarms.
- Location. Location. Put your smoke alarms in every bedroom, in hall-way close to sleeping areas, and in busy rooms like your living room, family room, but not in the kitchen where non-threatening cooking smoke (or burnt toast) can too easily set it off.

So go ahead, put a finger on it! Test all your smoke alarms once a month and save lives!

#### **CHIMNEY**

Cleaning your chimney on a regular basis prevents a smoke filled room and prevents fires and sparks which are fire hazards. Birds and other animals may nest in unmaintained chimneys. Call a Chimney Sweep service for help.

#### **CLEANING DRYER VENTS**

Dryer vents, hoses, and screens should be cleaned on a regular basis throughout the year. If your dryer vents through the roof of your home a chimney sweep can assist as well as your appliance repair company.

### **HVAC SYSTEMS**

Air conditioners are equipped with a drain that is clearly visible when changing the filter. This condensation drain should be cleaned on a regular basis. Not cleaning the condensation drain can result in clogs which can result in damage to your or a neighbor's home.

### **WATER HEATERS**

Check your water heater! The calcium content of central Texas water can cause the water heater to fill up with calcium. Contact your appliance service company to schedule a clean out of your hot water heater. It will extend the life of the appliance and increase efficiency.



Planning to be out of town? Even with a neighbor or a friend watching the house, it's a good idea to contact the VOWS Off Duty Officers to come do a Vacation House Check. (available year round)

Homeowners just need to email them a week in advance, please include the details of the attached sheet, you'll get a response it was received. They really need at least a week to hear from you in case more info needed, so don't wait until the last minute to email them!

Off Duty Officers that VOWS hires will come by and check on the house, NOT just drive by. They will check the door, etc.


