



How much time do you spend in the fresh air? For most people the answer may be only a few minutes a day while walking to their car, to the store, to work then back home at the end of the day.

A good amount of fresh air each day is needed no matter the weather or temperature. Studies have shown that opening a window even for 5 minutes a day can be very beneficial for your home. It is recommended your home be aired out daily, all year long.

Generally, the inside of a home has a higher amount of pollutants than the outside world, which may be difficult to believe. As more homes become energy efficient and more air tight, as homeowners use products to remove strong cooking and pet odors, and as people use 'freshening' sprays to treat carpets, sofas and pillows, pollutants and chemicals build up. Opening a window allows fresh air to clean and clear the air reducing pollutants in your home.


For odor issues, the simplest thing you can do is open a window. While cooking breakfast or dinner, consider creating a habit of opening a window then closing it when your meal is complete. This could make a huge difference in the quality of air in your home.





AMENITY CENTER RULES & REGULATIONS

Thinking of renting the Amenity Center for a party or event?

Please call the office today at (817) 741-1719 to reserve your spot.

The Amenity Center can be rented by VOWS homeowners for their personal use. However, in the interest of maintaining the Center, avoiding extra work for the on-site staff, avoiding potential damages and keeping the Center in good condition, rules and regulations have been established for its use. A few rules are as follows: No Alcohol, no pets, and no fog machines. For a complete list of rules visit our website at www.woodlandspringshoa.com.

When each homeowner rents the Amenity Center, a contract must be signed signifying their understanding, acceptance, an agreement to follow the rules and regulations regarding the rental. Violation of any of these rental conditions is cause for denial of future rentals.

A deposit of \$500 is also required. This deposit will be returned in full after the event if the Amenity Center is cleaned, put in order, and determined to be damage-free. A list of the charges that will be deducted from the deposit for non-compliance is provided each renter at the time the rental contract is signed.

Each renter should take pictures and provide them to the office staff to verify the condition of the Amenity Center when the rental is started in order to avoid potential deductions from the deposit amount.

SCAMS!

"Don't become a victim"

The phone scams have become increasingly deceptive. The scam solicitors need money, but don't want to work for it like we do. Here are some phone scams you may encounter

- IRS Agent Imposters The suspect agent will claim you owe money and/or will be arrested if you don't send what is due. DON'T BELIEVE IT! The IRS will NEVER call a consumer about unpaid taxes. They always correspond by letter. Consumers are asked to report these calls by going online at www.ftc.gov/ taxidtheft or calling the IRS directly at 1800 908-4490.
- If Tax Identity theft happens when someone uses your Social Security number to get a tax refund or a job. You might find out it has happened when you get a letter from the IRS saying more than one tax return was filed in your name, or IRS records show you have wages from an employer you don't know. You can visit www.irs.gov/uac/taxpayer-guide-to-identity-theft.
- False Family Accident A victim receives a call from a suspect claiming to be the victim's relative. The suspect claims to have been in an accident and needs cash. DON'T BELIEVE IT! Hang up on anyone asking for money, bank account information, Social Security numbers or to purchase gift cards. Call the relative to verify they called you.
- Computer Tech Imposters They claim there is something wrong with your computer/connection and they need information. DON'T BELIEVE IT!
- Utility Companies A person calls claiming to be a representative
 of your utility company. The fraudulent representative tells you
 that you have not paid your bill and your service is about to be
 shut off. DON'T BELIEVE IT! Call your utility company to
 verify that your account is current.
- NEVER let anyone in your home unless you are expecting someone. Always check their credentials.

Ken Paxton the Attorney General of Texas has many helpful pages of Scams and how to report them. www.texasattorneygeneral.gov/cpd/frauds-and-scams.

The information being collected from your electronic devices is becoming more sophisticated constantly. Google, Facebook and Linked-In are just some of the companies tracking you and collecting your information. Make sure you have all your security settings set to avoid having personal information stolen.

Be a buddy to your elderly neighbors and tell them about these scams. The elderly are most at risk of falling prey to these scams.

Things to Plant

FLOWER PLANTS: Ageratum, Ajuga, Joseph's Coat (Amaranthus), Balsam, Wax Begonia, Blue Daze, Blue Cardinal Flower, Boltonia, Scarlet Bouvardia, Calico Plant, Chocolate Plant, Cigar Plant (Cuphea Ignea), Cockscomb, Coleus, Columbine, Copper Plant, Coreopsis, Cosmos sulphureus, Dahlia, Shasta Daisy, Feverfew, Geranium, Gomphrena, Hibiscus, Hollyhock, Impatiens, Jacobinia, Lantana, Marigold (African, French and Mexican Mint), Nierembergia, Pentas, Periwinkle, Persian Shield, Plumbago, Phlox Drummondii, Portulaca, Purslane, Purple Coneflower (Echinacea), Rudbeckia Hirta, Salvia, Sedum, Stokes' Aster, Sunflower (helianthus), Torenia (Wishbone Flower), Yarrow, Zinnia.

FLOWER SEEDS: Ageratum, Balsam, Castor Bean, Celosia, Cleome, Cockscomb, Coleus, Coral Vine, Cosmos, Cypress Vine, Dahlia (Dwarf), Echinacea, Feverfew, Four-o'clock, Globe Amaranth, Gourd, Impatiens, Linaria, Nasturtium, Marigold, Moonflower, Morning Glory, Periwinkle, Petunia, Pinks, Portulaca, Scabiosa, Sunflower, Sweet Pea (Perennial), Tithonia, Torenia, Vinca, Zinnia.

BULBS: Achimenes, Acidanthera, Allium, Alstroemeria, Amarcrinum, Amaryllis, Bletilla (Ground Orchid), Caladium, Calla, Canna, Crinum, Dahlia, Daylily, Dietes, Ginger, Gladiolus, Gloriosa Daisy, Hosta, Hymerocallis (Spider Lily), Hypoxis, Liriope, Monkey Grass, Rainlily, Society Garlic, Tigridia.

VEGETABLES: Early-Mid Month: Peppers, Radish, Squash, and Tomato. All Month: Amaranth, Bean, Corn, Cucumber, Eggplant, Muskmelon, Okra, Peanuts, Pumpkin, Southern Pea, Sweet Potato, Tomatillo, Watermelon.

HERBS: Anise, Star Anise, Basil, Bay, Borage, Bouncing Bet, Caraway, Catnip, Chives, Comfrey, Costmary, Cumin, Fennel, Fenugreek, Scented Geranium, Germander, Horehound, Horseradish, Lamb's Ear, Lavender, Lemon Grass, Lemon Verbena, Mexican Mint Marigold (a great substitute for French Tarragon), Monarda, Oregano, Perilla, Rosemary, Sage, Santolina, Summer Savory, Winter Savory, Sesame, Sorrel, Southernwood, Tansy, Tarragon, Thyme, Common Wormwood, Roman Wormwood, Yarrow.

FRUIT: Bare root or container grown Pecans, Fruit trees, Grapes and Berry bushes.

THINGS TO DO IN APRIL

FERTILIZE: Fertilize azaleas a second time. Hydrangeas, camellias, gardenias, magnolias and Louisiana Irises also do well with azalea food. Tomatoes and peppers should be fed with a liquid fertilizer. Feed Crape Myrtle beneath the branch spread with 1/3-cup complete fertilizer per sq. yd. After second mowing, fertilize lawn with 3-1-2-ratio product, aerate first, if needed. Fertilize all houseplants with complete fertilizer. After blooming, feed bulbs with bone meal. Mulch trees, shrubs, vegetable garden and flower beds (after soil has warmed) with 2"-4" of mulch. Pine needles and oak leaves make good mulch for acid loving plants. Spread coffee grounds around azaleas and other acid loving plants.

WATER: Annuals and other dry soil areas a needed.

TRANSPLANT: divide and transplant late summer and fall flowering bulbs. Containergrown plants (almost any kind) can to into the ground now. Move azaleas and camellias, if needed. Plant summer annuals to get their root systems established before the extreme heat arrives.

LAWNCARE: Plant grass sod or plugs. Water daily for one or two weeks to aid in establishment. Begin regular lawn care. Mow every 5-7 days, leaving the clippings on the lawn. Keep St. Augustine grass at 2 1/2 to 3" height.

DISEASES/PESTS TO LOOK FOR: Spray roses with fungicide to prevent blackspot. Continue spraying peach and plum trees for curculio. Call Extension Office 512-854-9600 for spray schedule for fruit and nut trees. Watch for stinkbugs and early blight on tomatoes.

PRUNE: Spring-flowering shrubs and trees after they bloom. Prune climbing roses and other "once bloomers" as soon as they finish flowering. Divide chrysanthemums and pinch tips for bushier growth. Thin peaches 4 to 6 inches apart and plums 3 to 4 inches apart. Thin apples and pears to one per cluster.
