# The Responsibility of Neighbors and a Fence


The responsibility of neighbors regarding fences may vary by local statutes, personal arrangements, and HOA rules. You want to be on good terms with your neighbor, but sometimes tensions arise when mutual fence issues are viewed differently by each neighbor. When conflicting viewpoints come up, work to find a mutually satisfactory compromise. If

a mutual compromise cannot be found, look at the legal ramifications involved to see what your rights and responsibilities are.

If the fence in question is on a property line between your property



and your neighbors, both parties have a responsibility for its maintenance and replacement. Discuss with your neighbor what you consider to be the needs and steps to take for the repair before you begin the process. Make a plan that is agreeable to both parties. For example...you could both work on it, or hire a contractor and split the costs. All arrangements and costs should be understood beforehand. Remember, after you have repaired or replaced the fence, it's too late to ask your neighbor to share the costs since you proceeded on your own. Avoid trouble by talking to your neighbor and making joint decisions.

# **POOL SAFETY**

Summer is here and the pools are open and busy! As you can imagine, the last thing we ever want to do is close a pool and interrupt everyone's fun. However, your health, safety and well-being are our first and foremost concerns.

With that said, whenever there is a pool-related threat to your health and safety and the pool must be closed to protect you, we must and will do so immediately and without hesitation.

Pool closures can happen for a number of reasons

such as lightning, emergency phone failure or mechanical failure of the filtration and chemical water purification systems. But perhaps the one that occurs most often is FECAL CONTAMINATION.

Not a popular topic to be sure, but one we must discuss. This pool-closing event is avoidable to a great extent by taking a few simple steps:

- Use the rest room before you get into the
- 2. Take regular bathroom breaks.

Use rubber pant in addition to diapers (swim-proof or not). This is a VOWS Pool Rule and is MANDATORY. The pool monitors have been instructed to make sure that rubber pants are being worn in addition to diapers. Bathers not in compliance with this rule will be instructed to leave the water.

# **FACTS YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT DROWNING**

DROWNING WILL AFFECT YOU OR SOMEONE YOU KNOW.

Drowning is the leading cause of unintentional injury-related death in children ages 1-4



Drowning is the 2nd leading cause of unintentional injury-related death ages 1-14.

### DROWNING CAN STILL OCCUR EVEN IF YOU KNOW HOW TO SWIM.

NO ONE is "drown proof" – no matter their level of swimming ability.

Falls, entrapments, and injuries lead to drowning regardless of swimming level. A majority of people overestimate their own and their child's ability to swim, especially in a panic event.

## DROWNING IS QUICK AND SILENT.



Drowning occurs in as little as 2



Most children who drown are out of sight or missing for less than 5 minutes and usually in the presence of 1 or both parents.



Irreversible brain damage occurs in as little as 4 minutes.



Most children die who are submerged for as little as 6-10 minutes.

Children who drown do not scream, splash, or struggle. They silently slip beneath the water, even with adults & lifeguards present.

# **Drowning Prevention Tips**



## CONSTANT VISUAL SUPERVISION

Assign an adult WATER GUARDIAN whose only responsibility is to watch children who are in the water.

Teach children who cannot swim to stay away from water unless they are with an adult who is within arms reach and has eye-to-eye contact on them.

### LEARN TO SWIM

 Studies show that formal swim lessons for children under age 4 reduce drowning by 88%.
 Take swim lessons with your child if you don't know how to swim yourself. Even adults who are strong swimmers should never swim alone.



### KEEP BACKYARDS AND BATHROOMS SAFE

- Dump all water buckets and empty kiddle pools when they are not in use.
- Install safety latches on toilets.
- Never leave children unattended in the bathtub.



# **MULTIPLE BARRIERS ON ALL POOLS AND SPAS**

Install pool fences, self-closing, self-latching gates and door alarms in areas leading to pools and spas. Keep a phone by the pool and call 911 in an emergency.

Keep pool area picked up and clear of toys and other items which might attract an unsupervised child.



# ALWAYS CHECK POOL/SPA FIRST FOR MISSING CHILD

Make sure to look at the bottom of the pool or spa.

Do not quickly scan the top and move on - children who drown often sink to the bottom and appear as shadows that can easily be overlooked.

Every second counts.



### WEAR LIFE JACKETS

Children who cannot swim should always wear a properly sized Coast Guard approved life jacket.

Do not rely on water wings, floats, or other toys to to keep children safe.



Studies show CPR doubles the victim's chance of survival.

Use hard/fast compressions in the center of the chest until help arrives.

Refresh CPR skills yearly, certifications every two years.

· Post CPR guidelines near the pool.

FLOWER PLANTS: Ageratum, Ajuga, Alpine Aster, Balsam, Wax Begonia, Blue Daze, Boltonia, Cockscomb, Silver Dollar Plant (Lunaria Annua), Periwinkle, Portulaca, Purslane, Rudbeckia Hirta (Gloriosa Daisy), Salvia leucantha (Mexican Bush Sage), Sedum, Stokes' Aster, Torenia (Wishbone Flower), Vinca, Zinnia.

FLOWER SEEDS: Ageratum, Balsam, Castor Bean, Cleome, Cockscomb, Cosmos, Four-o'clock, Gaillardia (Blanket Flower), Impatiens, marigold, Moonflower, Morning Glory, Periwinkle, Portulaca, Tithonia, Torenia, Vinca,

BULBS: Colchicum (Autumn Crocus), Lirope, Lycoris, monkey Grass.

VEGETABLES: Early-Mid Month: Pumpkin, Sweet Potato. Mid-Late Month: Corn, Eggplant, Peppers, Southern Pea, Tomatoes, and Winter Squash. ALL Month: Okra

### THINGS TO DO IN JUNE

**FERTILIZE:** Give annuals a complete fertilizer, water well before and after. Deadhead and fertilize roses. Fertilize young fruit trees (except pears) with a 3-1-2-ratio product at 1 lb. per inch of trunk diameter.

**WATER:** Water all planted areas deeply but infrequently during dry periods. Outdoor container plants need daily watering. Consider landscaping with drought resistant native plants in the future.

SOIL: Mulch all bare soil. Turn compost pile and add new ingredients. Clean up spring vegetable gardens and replenish with compost.

LAWNCARE: Mow every 5-7 days, leaving the clippings on the lawn. Watch for take-all patch. Set mower higher in shady areas to promote denser turf.

DISEASES/PESTS TO LOOK FOR: Watch for Spider mites, leaf rollers, and lacebugs on azaleas. Chinch bugs, fleas, ticks, chiggers and grubs in lawns. Scale insects on euonymus, hollies, camellias. Webworms in pecans and persimmons. Powdery mildew on crepe myrtles and roses. Aphids on crepe myrtle, roses and Mexican milkweed. Scale on peaches and plums. Spray trunks to prevent borer attack. Remove any diseased leaves from beds; do not add to compost.

**PRUNE:** Remove vigorous growth from center of peach and plum trees to prevent shading of fruiting shoots. Tip new blackberry canes at 4' to force side branches. Prune dead and damaged wood from trees and shrubs as needed. Do not prune oaks.

# OTHER THINGS TO DO IN JULY

Plan fall garden and prepare beds by removing perennial weeds before tilling; add compost and fertilizer. Gather herbs and flowers to dry.

Preserve the bounty by freezing, canning or drying vegetables and fruits.





# DO YOUR TREES HAVE ROOT PROBLEMS?

Have you noticed a decline in the health of one or more of your trees? Yellowing or curling leaves, branches dropping off? Your first response might be to look up however looking down at the roots might actually be the right response. Trees are a valuable and important investment to the curb appeal of your home and community, to shading your home keeping utility costs down as well as to the health of the environment. Maintaining the overall condition of your trees might begin at the roots.



# GIRDLING ROOTS CAN MEAN A DEATH SENTENCE FOR YOUR BEAUTIFUL TREES...

but you might not even notice them, or know what they are. Girdling roots are caused when a root begins to circle and coil around the base of the tree trunk. Over time, as the root continues to enlarge, they inhibit proper trunk growth and the proper transfer of water and nutrients up into the tree. Girdling roots can occur in both container-grown and ball-and-burlap trees that have been left in their container or burlap bag too long. The roots don't have anywhere else to go but around and around essentially strangling the tree! Girdling roots can also be caused by failing to remove the wire from the root ball before planting, or from planting the tree too deep, or especially allowing too much soil to pile up around the base of the tree, or by allowing dense ground cover to grow around

the base of the tree which is what we see a lot of in our area landscaping.

When a tree's root flare is covered up with soil, oxygen is limited, and roots may grow

around the trunk under the excess soil. Roots below the soil could be weakened, compressed, diseased or grown through/around and wrapped up in a soaker or sprinkler sys-

tem. To the average homeowner, roots are seldom considered when maintaining trees. It is a good idea to seek the professional opinion and consultation of an experienced arborist to look at your trees and root system.

There are a few signs to look for which can indicate your tree roots might be in trouble. First, is the canopy of your tree changing or one side looking more affected



than the other? Second, does your tree lean? Third, have you noticed broken, dying or rotting roots? And finally, do you see fungal conks or mushrooms growing near the base of your tree? If the answer to any of these questions is yes, your tree needs help from an arborist.



It is recommended that your trees be inspected yearly by an arborist in order to save your trees, properly diagnosis treatment or perhaps remove any unsafe damaged trees ultimately saving you money. Healthy tree roots stabilize and sustain your valuable trees.

# — CODE BLUE CONNECTION — Burgers, Hot Dogs and the Law

It's summer time in Cowtown. Where the cement is hotter than the charcoal grill. A time for vacations, outdoor fun and creating memories. It's always good to think safety first. Here are some important safety tips to remember this summer.

**Curfew:** The City of Fort Worth has a curfew ordinance year-round. Minors 16 and under may not be on public property Sunday – Thursday 11pm. to 6am. or Friday and Saturday from 12:01am. to 6am.

**Fireworks:** You may not possess, manufacture, store, sell or handle fireworks, including sparklers. Fireworks are prohibited in Fort Worth and in Tarrant County.

Bicycle Laws: minors under 18 must wear a bike helmet in Fort Worth.

- Bicyclists should always obey all traffic laws, signs and signals.
- Never ride opposite the flow of traffic.
- Stop at all stop signs and red traffic signals.
- A bicyclist must keep one hand on the handlebars, at all times.
- Bicycles used at night shall be equipped with the following:
  - 1. A lamp on the front must emit a white light visible at a distance of at least 500 ft. to the front.
  - A red reflector on the rear, of a type approved by the TX Dept.
     of Public Safety which is visible from 50 to 300 feet. A red
     light on the rear visible from 500 feet may be used in addition
     to the red reflector.

Most Texas cities have their own bicycle laws. Don't assume the laws are all the same. For these and other Fort Worth laws and ordinances,

visit fortworthtexas.gov.

Review the basics of safety with your family and have a plan and secret password. Make sure your kids know all the routes to get home and which neighbors to go to in a time of need. As an added protection, put a whistle on your child's key ring. Teach them to be aware of their surroundings. Don't let them play alone outside without supervision. Never let your child answer the door alone! The door should not be opened unless you know who is there. Always speak through the closed door so the visitor knows there is someone at home.

Practice fire drills and make sure everyone knows how to operate the fire extinguisher and where it is located, in the home. Make sure the babysitter knows where your fire extinguisher is located.

If your child is old enough to be home alone, make sure all firearms and medication are secure. Make sure your child is aware of the rules you set for them, especially if they can leave the home or have visitors. Get to know your child's friends. Make sure your child knows the Fort Worth Curfew laws.

The Woodland Springs Code Blue Team has been trained and works with the Fort Worth Police. We have all passed background checks and are trained to help the FWPD in civilian capacity. We are extra EYES and EARS, for the dept.



# **AMENITY CENTER RULES & REGULATIONS**

# Thinking of renting the Amenity Center for a party or event?

Please call the office today at (817) 741-1719 to reserve your spot.

The Amenity Center can be rented by VOWS homeowners for their personal use. However, in the interest of maintaining the Center, avoiding extra work for the on-site staff, avoiding potential damages and keeping the Center in good condition, rules and regulations have been established for its use. A few rules are as follows: No Alcohol, no pets, and no fog machines. For a complete list of rules visit our website at www.woodlandspringshoa.com.

When each homeowner rents the Amenity Center, a contract must be signed signifying their understanding, acceptance, an agreement to follow the rules and regulations regarding the rental. Violation of any of these rental conditions is cause for denial of future rentals.

A deposit of \$500 is also required. This deposit will be returned in full after the event if the Amenity Center is cleaned, put in order, and determined to be damage-free. A list of the charges that will be deducted from the deposit for non-compliance is provided each renter at the time the rental contract is signed.

Each renter should take pictures and provide them to the office staff to verify the condition of the Amenity Center when the rental is started in order to avoid potential deductions from the deposit amount.

# **HOA Assessments**

Since the HOA was turned over to the homeowners, the Board of Directors has been investigating in depth the Accounts Receivable situation. In the past, the collections procedure has not been emphasized and acted upon within the full extent of the law. With the turnover, the Board is now in the position to rectify this situation.

Here are several tips to take to heart concerning the assessments billed to each homeowner twice a year:

- 1. Pay your assessment as soon as you get it so you don't forget about it! That means before December 30 and June 30 each year. The amounts added to your bill for sending you reminders along with penalties and interest (all legal and appropriate) will quickly increase the amount due. In fact, in a matter of months the original amount due will double! Most of this increase is due to what the HOA has to pay TO SEND YOU REMINDERS and other notices!
- 2. It is YOUR RESPONSIBILITY alone to make sure your payment is received BEFORE the due date. Mailing it or transferring it on the last day usually is not sufficient time to get it to the proper place to record receipt as being on time.
- 3. For homeowner accounts that have become delinquent, Late Fees and Late Fee Interest charges (soft costs to the HOA) may be waived if requested by the homeowner and approved by the Board on a ONE TIME ONLY per account basis. The hard costs (assessments and what the HOA has had to pay out because the payment was late) will not be waived. The other homeowners in the community should not have to support the costs of your late payment!
- 4. Payment plans are available for delinquent balances at an additional cost for setup. But remember, if you do not pay even one payment or are late on it, the whole situation reverts back to what it was.
- 5. If you want to pay monthly (deducted from your bank account), you must be current on your account in order to do this. This actually is paying in advance for the next assessment to be billed.
- 6. Yes, we will file liens, and we will foreclose. It simply is not right or fair to the other homeowners who pay on time, as you all agreed to when you signed the documents when you closed on your house, to do otherwise.

Follow these tips and pay your assessment before it becomes a much bigger problem than you may be able to handle. Folks, this is your home we are talking about.

# Preventing late fees on HOA dues

To prevent late fees on HOA dues, please pay your dues before January 31. A late fee will incur on February 1 and every month after until it is paid in full. Payments can be made online at ClickPay! The new online payment provider.

FirstService invites you to make individual payments or automatic payments online through ClickPay. **30 Days late:** \$245.00 Dues + \$25.00 1st Late fee + \$3.68 Interest %15 + \$15.00 Processing fee = \$288.68

**60 Days late:** \$288.68 Balance + \$25.00 2nd Late fee +\$4.33 Interest %15 + \$36.00 Notice fee = \$354.01

**90 Days late:** \$354.01 Balance + \$25.00 3rd Late fee + \$5.31 Interest %15 + 161.00 Demand Letter = \$545.32

120 Days late: Turned over to the Attorney for further collections
