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


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COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

Changing Times in Cowtown

2018 will most likely bring great change to Fort Worth. One day soon the population will push over one million residents. A new Bond package will help our infrastructure expand, changing our little two-lane roads into major thoroughfares. Interstate 35 will be headed toward completion. New restaurants will open near the outlet mall and the new Ikea. Construction will begin on new art sculptures in the median from Shiver to Timberland Blvd. Cowtown will be changing.

Our long awaited North Division Police Station will be opening in the first half of 2018. This station will have a community meeting room, our own North Division Captain, Detectives, Crime Prevention Specialist, and Citizen on Patrol Coordinator. Training for volunteer programs will be much easier to attend.

Even though Woodland Springs is built out and we now have a governing HOA Board, our directors will be working to keep our neighborhood top notch. We are very fortunate in VOWS that part of our dues pays for Off Duty Officers who are here to respond to crime, check our homes when we are on vacation, and patrol our streets both day and night. Many other neighborhoods don't have this advantage. In fact, many of our bordering neighborhoods don't even have a Citizens on Patrol Group to help deter crime. We are very fortunate to have all these safeguards in place. Our low crime rate is a direct result of these factors.

The Citizens on Patrol have been an active group in VOWS for 15 years! Since VOWS is so large, we always need more volunteers. Our members come and go just like our neighbors who move away. If you want to help us fight crime and keep VOWS one of the safest neighborhoods in Fort Worth, then consider becoming a volunteer.

All it takes is a background check, a four-hour training course, a visit to the 911 call center and a ride along with an on-duty Fort Worth Police Officer. You will be issued a radio, signs, a badge and a uniform. The volunteers can drive, ride a bike, patrol on foot or learn to become a base radio operator. The base operator monitors the patrollers and conducts an hourly rollcall. Radio basing can be done from the comfort of your own home. The Fort Worth program is so renown, that other cities, states and even countries look to us as a model for Community Policing.

The City of Fort Worth is so grateful for our help, they offer the volunteers gift cards as a reimbursement "Thank You" to help with our fuel costs. For every 25 hours of patrol, you can earn a \$50.00 gift card up to a max of \$500. per calendar year.

Crowd Pleasing Holiday Recipes

Date Swirl Cookies

Ingredients

FILLING:

2 cups chopped dates

1 cup water

1 cup sugar

1 cup chopped nuts

2 teaspoons lemon juice

DOUGH:

1 cup butter, softened

1 cup packed brown sugar

1 cup sugar

3 large eggs

1 teaspoon lemon extract

4 cups all-purpose flour

Directions

- 1. In a saucepan, combine filling ingredients. Cook over medium-low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture becomes stiff, about 15-20 minutes. Chill.
- For dough, cream butter and sugars in a bowl. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add extract. Combine flour, salt and baking soda; gradually add to creamed mixture and mix well. Chill for at least 1 hour.



- 3. On a lightly floured surface, roll out half of the dough to a 12-in. x 9-in. rectangle, about 1/4-in. thick. Spread with half of the filling. Roll up, starting with the long end. Repeat with remaining dough and filling. Wrap with plastic; chill overnight.
- 4. Cut rolls into 1/4-in. slices. Place 2 in. apart on greased baking sheets. Bake at 375° for 8-10 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool on wire racks. Yield: 4 dozen.

Christmas Brunch Casserole

Ingredients

1 pound bacon

2 onions, chopped

2 cups fresh sliced mushrooms

1 tablespoon butter

4 cups frozen hash brown potatoes, thawed

1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon garlic salt

1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

4 eggs

1 1/2 cups milk

1 pinch dried parsley

1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C).
- 2. Place bacon in a large skillet. Cook over medium-high heat until evenly brown. Drain and set aside. Add the mushrooms and onion to the skillet; cook and stir until the onion has softened and turned translucent and the mushrooms are tender, about 5 minutes.



- 3. Grease a 9x13-inch casserole dish with the tablespoon of butter. Place potatoes in bottom of prepared dish. Sprinkle with salt, garlic salt, and pepper. Top with crumbled bacon, then add the onions and mushrooms.
- 4. In a mixing bowl, beat the eggs with the milk and parsley. Pour the beaten eggs over the casserole and top with grated cheese. Cover and refrigerate overnight.Bake in preheated oven for 1 hour or until set.



2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract

Pinch of salt

COVENANT CORNER

HOMEBASED BUSINESSES

While you are allowed to have a home-based business, there are certain guidelines that must be followed. Is your business visible from the street? Is it creating traffic and parking problems for your neighbors? Is your business noisy or disturbing the peace? Here is what your CC&R's state about home-based businesses:

5.3.16 **Residential Use.** The use of a lot is limited exclusively to residential purposes or any other use permitted by this Declaration. This residential restriction does not, however, prohibit a resident from using a dwelling for personal business or professional pursuits provided that: (1) the uses are incidental to the use of the dwelling as a residence; (2) the uses conform to applicable governmental ordinances; there is no external evidence of the uses; (4) the uses do not entail visits to the lot by employees



or the public in quantities that materially increase the number of vehicles parked on the street; and (5) the uses do not interfere with

residents' use and enjoyment of neighboring Lots.

The Cost of Not Paying Dues

Not paying your dues by the due date can be costly. The Governing Documents allow the homeowners association to assess late fees as well as the costs of the letters to remind past due owners of their outstanding balances. So, if you don't pay your dues by the due date, here is what you might expect to pay –

| Assessment - Due January 1st | \$245 | Late after the 30th | | |
|------------------------------|--------------|----------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------|--|--|
| Reminder notice | \$15 | A reminder letter telling you an amount is owed, the cost of which is charged back to your account | | |
| Late Fee | \$25 | Charged in accordance with the HOA Governing Documents | | |
| Late Fee Interest | \$3.68 | 15% Charged in accordance with the HOA Governing Documents | | |
| Second Notice | \$36 | Sent Certified Notice in accordance with state law, providing 30 days to pay the dues | | |
| Late Fee + Interest | \$25 +\$4.33 | Per the HOA Governing Documents | | |
| Demand Letter | \$161 | Sent Certified Notice in accordance with state law, providing 30 days to pay the dues | | |

After the demand letter, the HOA can refer the matter to an attorney, who can file a lien, seek a judgement or, if necessary, ask the HOA Board if they wish to foreclose.

The HOA wants to work with you. If you are having a hard time paying you assessment, contact the office so we can help you establish a payment plan. The payment plan will allow you to get caught up in a reasonable period of time so that you can pay what is owed on your account.
