Are you getting ready to make an addition to your house or build a new shed or fence in your back yard? Before you break out the miter saw, make sure to get your plans approved by our association's architectural committee.

While it may seem arbitrary from an individual homeowner's standpoint, the architectural committee looks out for the entire community. Aside from stopping residents from painting pink polka dots on their houses, the committee's job is to make sure that the size and style of the project, the type of building materials being used and the overall look of the new structure adhere to the association's design requirements. Not only does this keep the community looking cohesive, it also helps to keep property values up by preventing individual structures from standing out. Of course, it's also important to note that unapproved structures might legally have to be removed at the owner's expense, so save yourself money and headaches by getting approval before building.

So when you're ready to start your new project, or if the design of your project changes midway through building it, send your plans to the architectural committee first so that we can make sure they're in compliance with the association's design standards. If we do find any issues, we'll let you know what they are and try to help you come up with other options. We appreciate all the hard work residents have done to make their homes and this community beautiful—help us keep this association looking great by keeping us in the loop of all your building projects.

Winter Safety

Before the chilly temperatures of winter set in, make sure your vehicle is prepared for the conditions, especially if you have plans for a winter road trip.

- Visit a mechanic for a tune up and routine maintenance check
- Make sure you know how your vehicle handles in snow covered or icy roads. Does your vehicle have antilock brakes? Know what to expect.
- Check all sensors, lights and cameras to make sure they are working properly
- When the temperature drops, so does the battery power. For gas and diesel engines, it takes more battery power to start your vehicle.
- For Electric and Hybrid Electric vehicles, the driving range is reduced when the battery is cold
- Make sure your washer reservoir has fluid with de-icer
- Inspect your tires for proper tread.



When the outside temperature drops, so does the tire inflation pressure. Check your owner's manual or driver's door for the correct pressure.

• Check your spare tire

When traveling in winter, carry all supplies you might need in an emergency

- Blankets
- Jumper cables
- Flashlight and Flares


- Shovel
- Food and Water

Here are some Winter Safety Tips

- Don't leave your vehicle warming up with the keys in the ignition.
- Always secure your children in safety car seats
- Never text and drive or drink and drive
- Drive slowly, don't rush on snow and ice
- Leave extra room in-between your vehicle and the one ahead
- When driving in poor visibility conditions, use your headlights
- Never leave valuables in plain view in a parked vehicle
- Always lock your vehicle

Avoiding Conflict with the Neighbors

We all *can* just get along. The key? Communication. It's often the best way to prevent and resolve conflict before it reaches the legal system. You don't have to be friends or spend time together to achieve a peaceful coexistence, but you should try to be a good neighbor and follow these tips:

Say hello. At the mailbox, while walking the dog or when you see a moving van arrive, introduce yourself. Learn your neighbors' names and regularly offer a friendly greeting.

Provide a heads up. If you're planning a construction project, altering your landscaping or hosting a big party, contact your neighbors beforehand.

Do unto others. Treat neighbors as you would like to be treated. Be considerate about noise from vehicles, stereos, pets, etc.

Know your differences. Make an effort to understand each other. Differences in age, ethnic background and years in the neighborhood can lead to different expectations or misunderstandings.

Consider the view. Keep areas of your property that others can see presentable.

Appreciate them. If the neighbors do something you like, let them know. They'll be pleased you noticed, and it'll be easier to talk later if they do something you don't like.

Stay positive. Most people don't try to create problems. If a neighbor does something that irritates you, don't assume it was deliberate.


Talk honestly. Tolerance is important, but don't let a real irritation go because it seems unimportant or hard to discuss. Let your neighbors know if something they do annoys.

Be respectful. Talk directly to your neighbors if there's a problem. Gossiping with others can damage relationships and create trouble.

Remain calm. If a neighbor mentions a problem they have with you, thank them for the input. You don't have to agree or justify any behavior. Wait for any anger to subside before responding.

Listen carefully. When discussing a problem, try to understand your neighbor's position and why he or she feels that way.

Take your time. Take a break to think about what you and your neighbor have discussed. Arrange to finish the conversation at another time.

Planting:

- Plant pre-chilled tulip and hyacinth bulbs (late December/early January). Plant daffodil and grape hyacinth.
- Plant pansies, flowering kale and cabbage, dianthus, cyclamen, violas and other cool season annuals.
- Continue to plant shade trees, fruit trees, and evergreen shrubs.

Pruning:

- Prune evergreen trees such as magnolias, live oaks, and wax myrtles if needed.
- Re-shape evergreen shrubs if needed.

Plant Care:

- Mulch leaves from the lawn. Shred excess leaves and add to planting beds or compost pile.
- Water lawn and all other plants once every three weeks or so, if supplemental rainfall is less than one inch in a three-week period.
- Fertilize cool-season color plants early in the month. Apply root-stimulator fertilizer to all newly transplanted trees and shrubs.
- Protect pansies, tender shrubs and other plants from hard freezes by covering with lightweight landscape fabric weighed down with bricks or rocks.

What your Board of Directors does for You



As a recognized homeowners association, our community has a board to help our HOA run smoothly. The board consists of volunteers who execute a wide variety of tasks you may not be aware of; however, their work affects every single resident.

One of the most important things the board does is create and enforce the association rules. While some residents may not like being told what they can and can't do, ultimately the board is looking out for the greater good. By enforcing the rules, the board is doing its best to keep property value up and conflicts down. Of course, the board wants to make sure the rules are beneficial for the majority—and hopefully all—residents. You are welcome to raise concerns about the rules at open board meetings.

Another major responsibility of the board is to collect assessments from homeowners. Collecting this money is important for the stability of the association, because the assessments pay for the common elements enjoyed by all residents. Assessments also help to replenish the reserve funds, which pay for any major repairs the association may need. The board is responsible for the association's finances, and collecting assessments is how it ensures that the association remains solvent.

Finally, the board acts on behalf of the association by hiring managers, attorneys, contractors and other professionals who help better the association. Board members also help conceive and lead many of the projects that will improve the HOA.

While it's a big job, board members are happy to serve the residents and make the community a great place to call home. So why not learn more about what these volunteers do by talking to your board members, attending an open board meeting or even running for a seat on the board during our next election? The more people we have looking out for our association, the stronger it will be.

PREVENTING PACKAGE THEFT

It's the most wonderful time of the year — until your package gets stolen from your doorstep.

With more than 75 package thefts reported in just one section of Capitol Hill at the beginning of this year, UPS says parts of the District are the worst in the region for package thefts.

Want to avoid these "crimes of opportunity"? Here are a few tips to keep your packages safe during the holidays:

- Ask for a tracking number to know when your package is delivered. Track your packages and try to be home at the time of delivery, the Alexandria Police Department suggests. When you're placing an order, try to schedule shipment for a day you expect to be home, if possible.
- Not sure if you'll be available for your tracked package's delivery? FedEx and United States Postal Service (USPS) suggest scheduling your delivery beforehand to set a time you know you'll be home.
- 3. FedEx also suggests requesting a signature for delivery. This will ensure the package won't be left at your door without you there to sign and bring it safely inside.
- 4. Want your package placed at the back door or behind a porch plant instead? Leave a note specifying what less conspicuous spot you would like it left. The FedEx Delivery Manager lets you leave delivery instructions on where you want your deliveries to be dropped off.
- 5. Have your packages delivered somewhere else. If you know you won't be home when your package will be delivered, FedEx and United Parcel Service (UPS) tell you to opt for delivering it to a neighbor who is home or to your workplace, if allowed.

6. Another option is to deliver your packages to a retail store or locker, where they'll stay safe until you can pick them up at your convenience. Many retailers will let you place online orders and then pick up your items in the store. You can also look into the Amazon Locker service, which delivers Amazon orders to a "locker" in your area; you're provided a pickup code that will unlock the door for you. And the U.S. Postal Service suggests taking advantage of their Request Hold Mail service, which securely holds letters and packages at

your local post office until you're back in town. FedEx and UPS also have similar location delivery services.

7. UPS suggests signing up for a service called "UPS My Choice," which allows users to request their packages to be held at a UPS store for pick-up and more. You can control the service through text or email; it includes features such as delivery notices and the option to re-route your packages to a different address if you won't be home. You can also re-route



AMENITY CENTER RULES & REGULATIONS

Thinking of renting the Amenity Center for a party or event?

Please call the office today at (817) 741-1719 to reserve your spot.

The Amenity Center can be rented by VOWS homeowners for their personal use. However, in the interest of maintaining the Center, avoiding extra work for the on-site staff, avoiding potential damages and keeping the Center in good condition, rules and regulations have been established for its use. A few rules are as follows: No Alcohol, no pets, and no fog machines. For a complete list of rules visit our website at www.woodlandspringshoa.com.

When each homeowner rents the Amenity Center, a contract must be signed signifying their understanding, acceptance, an agreement to follow the rules and regulations regarding the rental. Violation of any of these rental conditions is cause for denial of future rentals.

A deposit of \$500 is also required. This deposit will be returned in full after the event if the Amenity Center is cleaned, put in order, and determined to be damage-free. A list of the charges that will be deducted from the deposit for non-compliance is provided each renter at the time the rental contract is signed.

Each renter should take pictures and provide them to the office staff to verify the condition of the Amenity Center when the rental is started in order to avoid potential deductions from the deposit amount.






PARKING IN VOWS

- Be considerate of your neighbors and do not park or let guests park in or in front of your neighbor's driveway.
- Remember, RV's, Trailers, and Inoperable Vehicles are not allowed on property.
- Repairs or restoration of vehicles other than routine short-term maintenance.
- Community parking is limited, so please try to park in your garage and driveway whenever possible.
- Do not allow your car to overhang the sidewalk when parking in your driveway. This forces pedestrians and children to walk in the street, which is unsafe.
- If you park vehicles on the street, please ask visitors to be considerate and park in off street lots or in your driveway so that they don't take a neighbor's street parking.
- If you own more than 2 cars or have cars that won't fit in your driveway, please find an off-street parking lot to park these vehicles. Only park on the street as a last resort.
- Ensure that you are not blocking a resident's driveway and that your car is not making it difficult for another to enter or leave their driveway. Please park at least two feet from the farthest edge of any driveway.

DIY CHRISTMAS COUNTDOWN CALENDAR

SHOE ORGANIZER CALENDAR

Supplies:

- 1. Over the door pocket shoe organizer
- 2. 24 Plain or colored Note Cards
- 3. Clothes Pins
- 4. Christmas candy and wrapped trinkets or small toys This easy countdown calendar can be created fairly simply and can be displayed on a closet or hallway door. Hang the shoe organizer over a door, write the numbers 1 to 24 on the note cards and use the clothes pins to attach the note cards to each pocket. Place a Christmas candy or one wrapped toy in each pocket. Each day your child can remove the number and receive the surprise in the pocket.

MUFFIN TIN CALENDAR

Supplies:

- 1. Metal 24 muffin tin
- 2. Colorful Christmas paper cut into 24 circles slightly larger than the muffin cup opening
- 3. Marker or pen write the numbers 1 to 24 in the center of the circle
- 4. Christmas candy and small toys or trinkets
- 5. School Glue

Place a Christmas candy, toy or trinket in each muffin cup, and glue the numbered paper circles over the muffin cup. Let your child punch through one muffin cup each day to countdown til Christmas. (School glue washes off the muffin tin easily.)

Deanut Blossoms

The perfect treat for holiday cookie exchanges!

1 3/4 c. flour
1 t. baking soda
1/2 c. sugar (white)
1/2 c. brown sugar
1/2 t. salt
1 egg (unbeaten)
1/2 c. shortening
1 t. vanilla

1/2 c. peanut butter

Sift flour, baking soda and salt. In a separate bowl, cream shortening and peanut butter. Gradually add sugar (white) and brown sugar. Cream well. Add egg and vanilla. Beat well. Blend in the dry ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Shape dough into balls using a well rounded teaspoonful for each. Roll balls in sugar and place on greased baking sheet. Bake in 375° oven for 10 minutes. Remove from oven. Top each cookie with a chocolate kiss, pressing down firmly. Return to oven. Bake 2-5

minutes longer. (Cookies will crack around edge)

DECEMBER 2018 LANDSCAPE TIPS



Here are some great things to do in our landscapes in the month of December. Here's just a few of those tips:

- Put your FREEZE PLAN in effect
- Mulch beds for protection during winter months
- Continue to check your irrigation system monthly, and make sure you have a rain/freeze stat to shut it down when temperatures drop
- After the second freeze, if it happens this month, begin to cut back your perennials. You can mulch over them for some extra protection.
- And don't forget garden gifts for your favorite gardener during the holiday season.



Plant of the Month: Cyclamen


A common winter flower used in the landscape is the Cyclamen. It is not very winter hardy so you must consider covering in sub-freezing temperatures. It can do quite well throughout the winter except for those low temp nights. You can cover lightly with freeze cloth. It is best planted in somewhat protected areas near homes or buildings but is very colorful (reds, pinks, white, fuchsia) in shade or sun.



Ever wonder about Poinsettias?

How about a few fun facts...and myths about these beautiful Holiday plants.

- Joel Roberts Poinsett introduced the poinsettia plant to the U.S. from Mexico.
- In Mexico the poinsettia is a perennial shrub that will grow 10-15' tall.
- There are more than 100 varieties of poinsettias available today.
 Most noted varieties are red, white, pink and speckled.
- The showy colored parts of poinsettias are not the flowers of the plant, but instead are actually colored bracts (modified leaves).
- Poinsettias are not poisonous has some would like to believe. A study at Ohio State University showed that a 50 lb. child would have to consume more than 500 leaves to have any harmful effect... besides the taste is probably awful.
- Best to keep pets away from snacking on poinsettias as it can cause gastric distress...and all that is implied with that!
- The plant does ooze a milky sap which may cause skin reactions/ rashes, especially those with latex allergies.
- December 12th is Poinsettia Day, which marks the death of Joel Roberts Poinsett in 1851.



There's nothing as serene as a warm, crackling fire on a cold, winter night. There's also nothing more dangerous if your chimney is damaged.

Broken or cracked chimneys can let heat, smoke and toxic gasses, such as carbon monoxide, into your home. Your home could even catch fire. Chimney damage is often obvious, but sometimes it can be hidden. Use the following checklist, provided by Ready Virginia!, to help ensure that you can enjoy your fireplace and avoid problems—or even a disaster:

- Check to see if bricks have fallen or the chimney is leaning.
- Look for shiny areas on your exterior metal chimney pipe.
 This could mean the chimney has shifted—during the recent East Coast earthquake, for instance.
- Look for cracks at joints where the chimney connects to the firebox, at the roofline and in the attic.
- Check for debris that may have fallen into the fireplace.
- Use a screwdriver to check the mortar between the bricks or stones. If it crumbles when you pick at it, the chimney may be a hazard and probably needs work.
- When in doubt, consult a licensed engineer or contractor.
 For the name of an inspector, call your insurance or mortgage company.

Remember, disasters can happen even in the best of homes. That's why every home should be equipped with carbon monoxide and smoke detectors. Here are a few tips:

- Install carbon monoxide and smoke detectors in sleeping areas and on every level of your home and away from air vents. Interconnected smoke alarms are best, because if one sounds, they all sound.
- Test smoke alarms monthly, and change alkaline batteries at least once a year. Use a familiar date, such as your birthday or when you change your clocks, as a reminder.
- Prepare and practice a fire escape route with everyone in your home, including children.
