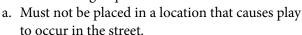


### **COVENANT CORNER**

### ROSES Texas Bluebonnets

In 1901 Bluebonnets were adopted as the official State Flower of Texas. Dark blue, almost purple flowers with stark white centers arranged in dense clusters are found along Texas highways, roads, fields and pastures. These beautiful wildflowers bloom from March to May.

The Texas Hill Country is known for their abundance of bluebonnets. From Austin, on almost every highway leading out of town, the roads and highways are lined with miles of bluebonnets. The Texas Hill Country towns like Marble Falls, Burnet and Brenham are recognized as excellent places to view bluebonnets with many other fun sights to see along the way.

Closer to North Dallas is the town of Ennis, Texas which is home of the "Official Texas Bluebonnet Trail" since 1997, just 60 miles on Highway 75/45. April 1st through April 30th , the Ennis Garden Club sponsors 40 miles of mapped driving trails for viewing and photographing Texas bluebonnets. Many of these



trails are the oldest in the state and visitors from all around make their way to Ennis to see this gorgeous display of wildflowers. The Ennis Garden Club works in conjunction with the Ennis Visitors Bureau (open 7 days a week) for the latest status of blooming insuring visitors are well informed to the best trails. Ennis has also launched a free mobile app for iPhone

and Android called "Ennis Y'all". The app features the bluebonnet trail map using GPS locations as well as directory of restaurants, shops, events and more.

Before you set off on a bluebonnet trail this spring, be sure to search www.wildflowerhaven.com for wildflower reports and sighting for the entire state of Texas.

Congratulations to Frank McArthur, Chris Collins, and Chad Pack who were elected to serve on the Board of Directors for 2019.

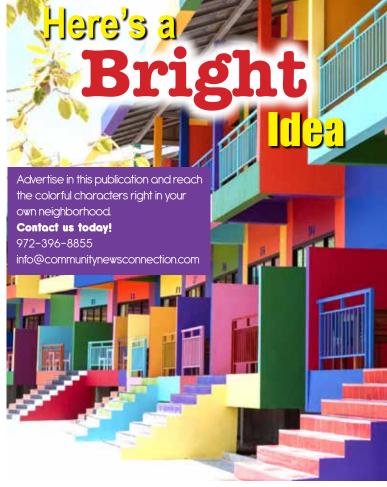
### Daddy Daughter Dance

### **Meet Lola Catron (1)**

Diagnosis: Double Inlet Single Left Ventricle Hypoplastic Aortic Arch with an Atrial Septal Defect

Lola was born with CHD on October 4th 2016. Within the first 3 days of life she had her first Open Heart Surgery (OHS), the Norwood Procedure. The first 5 weeks of life were very touch and go for Lola, but she came out strong in the

end. On Christmas day Lola's heart function started declining fast and she was hospitalized for the third time. On January 3rd Lola had her second OHS, the Glenn Procedure. Despite these invasive procedures Lola's CHD journey is far from over. She will have a third OHS the summer before her third birthday, and a Heart Transplant later in life. This is a disease Lola will face for the rest of her life. But with more awareness and better funding for research we can help children like Lola have a future.

### LOVE FOR HUMANITY

January 15th - August 28th 2019

The City of Fort Worth invites residents to express Love for Humanity during the Kindness Campaign January 15th – August 28th 2019.

There are many ways to recognize the life and legacy of Martin Luther King Jr., but none as important or meaningful as making a personal commitment to move forward rooted in the ideals of King's legacy: Crossing racial and cultural divides, through service and kindness, based on the philosophy of nonviolence.

## INDOOR WATER CONSERVATION TIPS

You can reduce your water consumption by 20-40 percent without purchasing expensive equipment. Reducing water use can mean substantial savings on water, sewage and energy bills. The following suggestions will help you get in the habit of saving water...

### **KITCHEN**

- Avoid the garbage disposal. It uses a lot of unnecessary water and can lead to problems with septic systems. Start a compost pile instead!
- Run automatic dishwashers only with a full load.
- When washing dishes in the sink, use one side of the sink or a large bowl for rinsing, rather than running water.
- Keep a container of water in the refrigerator for cold drinks. If you have to run your tap while waiting for cold water, collect running water in pitcher for later use.

### **BATHROOM**

- Install a low-flow aerator on your showerhead and sink. These devises can be purchased at a hardware store and are easy to install. They reduce flow to approximately three
- gallons per minute instead of the usual five to 10 in a shower.
- Turn off tap water while brushing your teeth or shaving.
- Take shorter showers. During droughts, turn off water while soaping up.

### Coffee Grounds Are Worth Saving

Gardens, flowerbeds, plants and your lawn will look and be better when used coffee grounds are applied. It is easy, simply sprinkle coffee grounds around indoor and outdoor plants, add the grounds to potting soil or distribute directly on your lawn and water it in. Rhododendrons, hydrangeas and azaleas use the nitrogen and acid from the coffee grounds for amazing blooms. You can also add coffee grounds in your watering can for a nitrogen boost as you water.

Prevent ants, snails and slugs by using coffee grounds as a barrier around plants or apply to areas where these pests are known to frequent as a repellent. Another idea to rid your yard or patio of pests is to fill a jar with old coffee grounds, line the neck of the jar with doubled sided tape. The smell of the coffee will draw pests to the jar and the tape will trap them inside.

To sharpen your garbage disposal blades, merely run water in your sink and add one tablespoon of grounds to a running disposal.

When cleaning dishes and utensils, a teaspoon of old coffee grounds can be poured onto your dish cloth to scour grease and grime away.

Next time you wash your hands after cooking, cutting or dicing foods like garlic and fish, grab a small scoop of old coffee grounds, mix with soap, lather together in your hands to help remove the odors.

If you use real wood in your fireplace and know the mess of cleaning out the ashes, try scattering old coffee grounds over the ashes to cut down on the flying dust. For an artsy antique looking piece of paper, soak an old cloth in a mixture of used coffee grounds and water then blot the edges of the paper with the cloth. Be sure you use an old cloth as coffee stains.

Coffee grounds will mold unless reused within a day or two. To save coffee grounds, it is a good idea to dry them. Spread a very thin layer of coffee grounds on a cookie sheet, heat your oven to 350 degrees, then turn the oven off, place the coffee lined cookie sheet in the oven and leave overnight. Dry coffee will not mold and can be stored in containers for more uses!

Use dry coffee grounds to soak up odors in your shoes overnight and in the morning shake shoes over trash bin before wearing.



### **AMENITY CENTER RULES & REGULATIONS**

### Thinking of renting the Amenity Center for a party or event?

Please call the office today at (817) 741-1719 to reserve your spot.

The Amenity Center can be rented by VOWS homeowners for their personal use. However, in the interest of maintaining the Center, avoiding extra work for the on-site staff, avoiding potential damages and keeping the Center in good condition, rules and regulations have been established for its use. A few rules are as follows: No Alcohol, no pets, and no fog machines. For a complete list of rules visit our website at www.woodlandspringshoa.com.

When each homeowner rents the Amenity Center, a contract must be signed signifying their understanding, acceptance, an agreement to follow the rules and regulations regarding the rental. Violation of any of these rental conditions is cause for denial of future rentals.

A deposit of \$500 is also required. This deposit will be returned in full after the event if the Amenity Center is cleaned, put in order, and determined to be damage-free. A list of the charges that will be deducted from the deposit for non-compliance is provided each renter at the time the rental contract is signed.

Each renter should take pictures and provide them to the office staff to verify the condition of the Amenity Center when the rental is started in order to avoid potential deductions from the deposit amount.

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### CODE BLUE CONNECTION FWPD Off Duty-Officers

Have you ever wondered what your HOA Dues pay for? Woodland Springs is one of the few neighborhoods that contract with FWPD to have Fort Worth Officers work as Off-Duty. You can't tell by looking at the patrol car or their uniform, since they drive the same patrol car and wear their regular uniform while they are here. They can make stops, write citations and work in full capacity while working Off-Duty. The only thing they can't do, is leave Woodland Springs.

The benefit to paying for Off-Duty Officers has been a tremendous advantage for Woodland Springs, since our population is that of a small city. They address crimes trends, speeding vehicles, curfew violators, reckless driving or a suspicious person/vehicle, just to name a few. The Off-Duty Officers can answer a call for service in VOWS with immediate response time. We have had some great success stories from the Off-Duty responding and apprehending suspects. Our Off-Duty have been instru-



mental in eliminating known drug houses and helped with the apprehension of the human trafficking situation on Yellow Wood Dr.

We also have a unique Vacation Watch program in VOWS. The resident can contact the Off-Duty Officers via email (www.police4vows@gmail.com) and request their home be watched while they are out of town. The Officer will go to the house and check the doors to make sure everything looks ok.

It's hard to put a price tag on having immediate response when an emergency occurs. This is money well spent for the homeowner, since it is not only providing safety, it keeps our property values up, because the crime rates stay down. With the work from our Off-Duty and the volunteering of our Citizen's on Patrol, Woodland Springs continues to be one of the safest neighborhoods in North Fort Worth.

### **Mail Chime for Your Mailbox -**



Tired of walking to your mailbox only to find that the mail has not been delivered yet? What if you could be alerted when your mail is actually delivered? With a Mail Chime Wireless Mail Alert System you CAN know instantly when you have mail in your mailbox.

Do-it-yourself projects can be immensely rewarding, but even a small repair can turn into a more frustrating and time-consuming job when you encounter unexpected problems. Here are some easy tips for tackling common home hardware problems that will leave you with a sense of accomplishment rather than a sense of frustration:

- Loose Screws: If a screw is so loose that it's barely gripping, remove it, wrap its threads with a few strands of steel wool, and screw it back into its old hole.
  - If a screw has been ripped out of its hole entirely and the hole is too big for the threads to gain hold, slide a wooden match into the hole and then replace the screw.
- **Tight Screws:** Twisting screws into a bar of soap first makes them easier to insert. A few drops of white vinegar will help remove stubborn screws from a metal surface.
- **Better Grips:** Improve your grip by wrapping a thick rubber band around the plastic handle of a screwdriver. This makes tightening and loosening screws less strenuous.
- Hammer Help: When hammering a small nail, brad or tack, slip
  the fastener between the teeth of a pocket comb to protect your
  fingers from the hammer's blow. Don't have a comb handy? You
  can also use a bobby pin, a paper clip or tweezers to hold the nail.
  - When hammering a nail in a tight spot or hard-to-reach corner, a bit of modeling clay or chewing gum will hold the nail in place for the first couple of blows.
- Rusted Nuts and Bolts: Removing a rusted nut or bolt can be an especially frustrating task. Pour hydrogen peroxide, lemon juice or cola over the rusted fastener and wait half an hour. The mild acid will dissolve the rust enough for the nut or bolt to turn freely.
- **Rusted Tools:** Working with rusted tools makes any job more difficult. Clean off the rust by rubbing a paste of six parts salt and two parts lemon juice on the rusted areas with a dry cloth, then rinse and dry thoroughly.

Spring cleaning is right around the corner, and for many homeowners that could mean out with the "old" and in with the "new" but what to do with the "old" when it's not quite ready for the landfill? Donating used items is a great option as long as you do a little homework to find out which local organizations and donation centers are most appropriate for the items you'd like to give away. Use the following tips as a guideline for determining what goes where and how to get it there.

- Many items are eligible for donation. You might be surprised to learn exactly what items you can donate. In addition to clothing and furniture, cars, cell phones and other electronics, fitness equipment, home appliances—even art supplies and old towels—are widely accepted by specialized organizations. If you're looking to donate a unique item, or several of the same items in bulk, do some further research about local organizations and donation centers in need of specific things.
- Consider what shape your items are in to determine where you donate. If you're planning to donate a broken refrigerator, make sure the organization is aware the item is in need of repair. Some donation centers accept broken items for parts; however, most organizations and donation centers prefer to accept gently used items in working condition. Be sure to communicate the item's condition prior to arranging a donation.
- After choosing where to donate, decide how you'll get the
  items to the organization. Oftentimes large organizations
  and donation centers are able to arrange a day and time to
  pick up your unwanted items directly from your home or
  business. Smaller organizations in need might instead have
  certain days and times available for you to arrange a drop off
  at a specified location.
- Make sure to get a donation receipt for tax purposes. Before donating, make a detailed list of the items you'll be giving away along with the estimated values. Keep in mind that, since the items are used, price points might be lower than expected. When your items are picked up or dropped off, request a receipt from the organization or donation center to keep track of what to count as a tax deduction. Speaking with a tax professional for advice also is a good idea.

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### **Apple's Screen Time**

Have you checked your Screen Time yet on your Apple device? Recently, Apple added a Screen Time section to the Settings on iPhones and iPads in order to give insight and control on your actual screen time. The effects of the amount of time people spend on Twitter, Instagram, Facebook and other apps is still undetermined. However understanding your usage could be the



beginning of determining effects for you personally with a detailed report of daily and weekly activities.

To get to Screen Time, go to

Settings, then choose Screen Time, touch the graph where you will find detailed information on the amount of time you spend on specific apps, how many times you pick up your phone per hour, the times of day you use your phone and more. This is a great way to check yourself and see what is really happening on your phone, as you might not even realize how much time you spend on your device and certain apps.

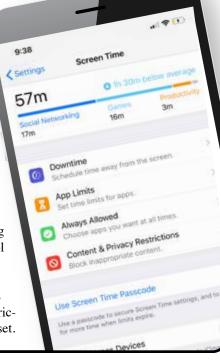
Screen Time has incorporated ways that can restrict and limit your time, if needed, in the sections Downtime and App Limits.

In the Downtime section, you can set a daily time when you do not want to be on certain phone apps (you choose which apps to set) but your phone calls will still be available. The device screen will dim for the allotted time and

light back up once the down-time is completed.

In the App Limits section, you can limit yourself on apps that you feel you are spending too much time. To limit your apps, you choose a specific amount of time to use the specific app (s), such as one hour a day

If you use Family Sharing there is a Parental Control Screen Time, to see how much time your kids are spending on their devices and determine if any restrictions or limits should be set.





### Insulated Garage Doors

As energy costs go up, many homeowners look for ways to make their homes more efficient and lower costs. One way to lower costs and improve energy use in your home is to install insulated garage doors. An attached garage that is not sealed or insulated may actually be a significant link in high energy costs.

ince garages are not considered actual living spaces, building standards are lower. As a result, garages have gaps and some air leakage making them the least efficient part of your home. This could mean that the rooms sharing a wall with your garage may allow cold air in and heat out in winter.

Besides lowering energy costs, insulated garage doors are sturdy and stronger than ordinary single layer garage doors. An insulated garage door frame is usually steel or aluminum filled with insulation then sandwiched between door panels, creating a much durable garage door.

An added benefit to replacing your garage doors with insulated doors is that they are much quieter especially to the walls attached to the garage. Insulated doors are layered tightly together and are often heavier making them less likely to vibrate on the garage door track.

Expensive items such as your car, lawn equipment and machinery in an insulated garage are more protected from freezing conditions. Freezing temperatures affect battery life, air pressure in tires and fluids in your car. If you store paint, cleaning and other supplies in your garage, an insulated door will help extend the life of these products.

And finally, if you use your garage for more than parking your car, such as woodworking or other hobbies, an insulated garage will be warmer in winter and cooler in summer.

Replacing your existing garage doors with insulated doors may cost more than single layer doors but the benefits and lower energy bills are a great investment in the future of your home.
