

COVENANT CORNER

How to Read the Association's Financial Report

Many states require association boards to submit financial reports to association members—or, at least, make them available on request. A financial report includes information that association board members use to plan the community's annual budget and direct its financial operations. Examining the association's financial reports shows you how your money—and your neighbors'—is being used.

The following may help you understand what your association report contains:

- Start with the summary. The year's financial highlights—what was earned, what was spent and what remains available in reserves—is usually summarized in simple language in the first page or two of the report.
- Read essential financial data. Pay attention to the association's cash
 position and reserve fund balances, which will be indicated separately from the operating funds. The financial report should be separated into the following parts:
 - » The balance sheet includes the association's assets (income and reserves) and liabilities (what is owed) at a specific point in time.
 - » The income statement indicates what money the association can expect from regular and special assessments and other sources like clubhouse rental or interest from investments.
 - » The statement of cash flow is a summary of anticipated income and expected expenses than may include utilities, maintenance contract payments—landscaping, pool, trash pickup, elevators—as well as insurance costs, payroll and taxes
- Review marketing information. Prospective buyers often ask to see an association's financial statements, so basic marketing data about the community may be included in the report. This information can be valuable in marketing your own home if you decide to sell.



The VOWs community has MANY kind hearted residents who step-up at a moments' notice to help residents in need. Whether it's advice, time, labor, transportation, services, support or monetary contributions, VOWS residents are known for open arms, big hearts and deep pockets! Some of which are so humble, they remain anonymous their entire life. We as a community should be proud that the residents of VOWS care enough to make a difference in North Fort Worth.

We can be daily examples to our children of the "Spirit of Volunteering." By our commitment, they can see firsthand how a community comes together. Reaching Others When DISASTERS Strike

The first thing many of us do during or immediately following a natural disaster is to call family and friends. Unfortunately, in the minutes and hours after a disaster, overloaded cell phone networks can make it difficult—if not impossible—to reach others. While there is no guarantee, the following tips can increase your chances of getting through when it matters most.

- Even if you have a traditional landline, keep a corded phone in your home. It will work even if you lose power.
- Keep a list of emergency phone numbers in your cell phone and near your home phone.
- Prepare a family contact sheet with at least one out-of-town person who can serve as your family's emergency contact. Often it's easier to make long distance rather than local calls during an emergency.
- Have charged batteries and car phone chargers for back-up power.
- Subscribe to text alert services from local or state governments and schools to receive emergency alerts.
- Use text messaging, e-mail or social

- networks such as Facebook, Twitter and Linked In instead of making calls on your cell phone. Texts and e-mails are less likely to experience network congestion. You can use social media to let family and friends know you're okay.
- Keep phone calls brief to avoid tying up voice networks.
- Conserve your cell phone battery by reducing screen brightness and closing apps you are not using.
- Limit streaming videos, downloading music or playing video games on cell phones after a disaster to help emergency calls get through to 911.
- Call 911 only if you have a life-threatening emergency.

Equipped with a Volley ball net, Tether ball and Corn Hole boards, the Westside Sand Beach is a close-to-home destination for summer fun. To create it, construction crews had to install over 250 cubic yards of real beach sand and then in some areas back-fill it up to 18 inches deep! They also created a rock swale midway across for quicker rain drainage. This inviting beach is ready-for-prime-time playtime for all our kids, big and small. Although we don't have any crashing waves, (and there is no swimming allowed in the retention ponds), we can all enjoy a brief respite, imagine aquamarine seas, and get our toes warm and sandy. Now put your slippers on before you freeze those toes off!

Both the west and east side sand beaches will be graded and cleaned regularly to keep them looking their best all year long. AMENITY CENTER RULES & REGULATIONS

Thinking of renting the Amenity Center for a party or event?

Please call the office today at (817) 741-1719 to reserve your spot.

The Amenity Center can be rented by VOWS homeowners for their personal use. However, in the interest of maintaining the Center, avoiding extra work for the on-site staff, avoiding potential damages and keeping the Center in good condition, rules and regulations have been established for its use. A few rules are as follows: No Alcohol, no pets, and no fog machines. For a complete list of rules visit our website at www.woodlandspringshoa.com.

When each homeowner rents the Amenity Center, a contract must be signed signifying their understanding, acceptance, an agreement to follow the rules and regulations regarding the rental. Violation of any of these rental conditions is cause for denial of future rentals.

A deposit of \$500 is also required. This deposit will be returned in full after the event if the Amenity Center is cleaned, put in order, and determined to be damage-free. A list of the charges that will be deducted from the deposit for non-compliance is provided each renter at the time the rental contract is signed.

Each renter should take pictures and provide them to the office staff to verify the condition of the Amenity Center when the rental is started in order to avoid potential deductions from the deposit amount.



Calling *AFTER-HOURS*877-378-2388

After regular business hours, our management company has a very efficient emergency response system in place in order to respond to appropriate emergencies, which are situations that can cause the damage of property. You may reach out Customer Care Center after hours at 877-378-2388.

Our management company can do little about your neighbor's dog barking at 3am. We recommend calling the police non-emergency number at 817-392-1234. The best way to handle this kind of situation long term, is for you and other affected neighbors to report it in writing each time an incident occurs and submit it to the City of Fort Worth.

Prowlers and vandals are best handled by the local law enforcement officials. The quickest, most effective response and enforcement will come from the Police department.

However, if a broken common area sprinkler or irrigation timer is threatening property, the management company should be notified by calling the Customer Care Center number listed above. Our staff is on call, and will handle the emergency as soon as possible.

A rule of thumb to remember when determining whether or not to call the management company after-hours is that if the property threatening situation can be addressed by one of the Association's contractors, and if not reported immediately will cause personal or property damage, then call.

Remember, our Board of Directors and management depend on the eyes and ears of the community to make sure that all of community's needs are met. Please don't hesitate to contact management during normal business hours with any questions you may have about the after-hours policy.

Late Fees on Past Due Assessments

Semi-annual assessments are due on January 1st and July 1st each year. Please pay the full amount due by January 30th and July 30th respectively, or late fees will occur. Payments can be made online at ClickPay.com, the online payment provider for FirstService Residential. Homeowners can make one-time payments or set up monthly payments through ClickPay. Payments can be made by e-check (ACH) for free, or by credit/debit card for a small processing fee. Get started by creating your account at www.ClickPay.com/FirstService.

Late fee schedule as follows:

30 Days late: \$270.00 Dues +\$25.00 1st Late fee + \$15.00 Reminder Notice = \$310

60 Days late: \$310 Balance + \$25.00 2nd Late fee + \$15.00 Second Notice = \$350

90 Days late: \$350 Balance+ \$25.00 3rd Late fee +\$80.00 Demand Letter = \$455

A late fee of \$25.00 will be applied each month until the balance exceeds \$800.00. Once the balance exceeds \$800.00, the account will be transferred to the attorney for collection and homeowner will incur substantial additional legal expenses.





A GUIDE TO STAIN REMOVAL

Simple Stain-Removing Solutions

ry as you might to prevent them, spills, drips and splatters in your house are inevitable. Whether you, your family or your guests are the culprits, stains happen. Most, if not all, are treatable, especially if you act quickly and use the right stain-removing technique.

If there's an accident on your carpet or a rug, start by scooping up any solids and soaking up any unabsorbed liquids. Then, blot the stain with a white cloth or paper towel. You should work from the outside in so you don't spread the spill, and dab at it instead of rubbing or pressing hard.

You also can try spot cleaning with a soapy water mix. Dilute a 1/4 teaspoon of clear hand-dishwashing soap with 1 cup of lukewarm water. Spray the solution on the stain, and mist the area with clean water or blot with a wet towel. Then blot the area with a dry towel. Repeat this process until you get as much residue out as possible.

Follow these specific instructions for cleaning up the more stubborn stains and sticky spots on your floors:

RED WINE

Begin with the same three steps—blot, apply soapy water and rinse. Then, dribble very hot water from



SOFT DRINKS & COFFEE

Begin with the same three steps—blot, apply soapy water and rinse. Then dab on hydrogen peroxide. Wait one hour before repeating the process. Hydrogen peroxide bleaches a stain without breaking down carpet dyes. Use a 3 percent solution, which can be found at a drugstore, and apply at full strength.

CANDLE WAX & CHEWING GUM

These are easiest to remove when hot or cold. For the cold method, harden the spot by rubbing it with an ice cube inside a plastic bag. Then, carefully scrape off the residue with a dull knife or a plastic card, such as an expired credit card. For the hot method, apply paper towels over the waxy area, and then use a clothes iron on low heat to soak up the wax. Replace the paper towels until all the wax is removed. Use

a hair dryer to a plastic bag over your fingers, pull the goo off.


your carpeting endures a nasty spill, rest assured that it doesn't have to become a permanent stain. With these simple tips, you can keep your carpets and rugs looking great for years to come.



Spring cleaning is right around the corner, and for many homeowners that could mean out with the "old" and in with the "new"—but what to do with the "old" when it's not quite ready for the landfill? Donating used items is a great option as long as you do a little homework to find out which local organizations and donation centers are most appropriate for the items you'd like to give away. Use the following tips as a guideline for determining what goes where and how to get it there.

- Many items are eligible for donation. You might be surprised to learn exactly what items you can donate. In addition to clothing and furniture, cars, cell phones and other electronics, fitness equipment, home appliances—even art supplies and old towels—are widely accepted by specialized organizations. If you're looking to donate a unique item, or several of the same items in bulk, do some further research about local organizations and donation centers in need of specific things.
- Consider what shape your items are in to determine where you donate. If you're planning to donate a broken refrigerator, make sure the organization is aware the item is in need of repair. Some donation centers accept broken items for parts; however, most organizations and donation centers prefer to accept gently used items in working condition. Be sure to communicate the item's condition prior to arranging a donation.
- After choosing where to donate, decide how you'll get the
 items to the organization. Oftentimes large organizations
 and donation centers are able to arrange a day and time to pick
 up your unwanted items directly from your home or business.
 Smaller organizations in need might instead have certain days
 and times available for you to arrange a drop off at a specified
 location.
- Make sure to get a donation receipt for tax purposes. Before donating, make a detailed list of the items you'll be giving away along with the estimated values. Keep in mind that, since the items are used, price points might be lower than expected. When your items are picked up or dropped off, request a receipt from the organization or donation center to keep track of what to count as a tax deduction. Speaking with a tax professional for advice also is a good idea.

Consider donating to our local charities such as Community Storehouse, Donation House, or volunteer your time at Sunshine Spaces. Remember, the community garage sale is April 24th – 26th.
