# Thinking of renting the Amenity Center for a party or event?

Please call the office today at (817) 741-1719 to reserve your spot.

The Amenity Center can be rented by VOWS homeowners for their personal use. However, in the interest of maintaining the Center, avoiding extra work for the on-site staff, avoiding potential damages and keeping the Center in good condition, rules and regulations have been established for its use. A few rules are as follows: No Alcohol, no pets, and no fog machines. For a complete list of rules visit our website at www.woodlandspringshoa.com.


When each homeowner rents the Amenity Center, a contract must be signed signifying their understanding, acceptance, an agreement to follow the rules and regulations regarding the rental. Violation of any of these rental conditions is cause for denial of future rentals.

A deposit of \$500 is also required. This deposit will be returned in full after the event if the Amenity Center is cleaned, put in order, and determined to be damage-free. A list of the charges that will be deducted from the deposit for non-compliance is provided each renter at the time the rental contract is signed.

Each renter should take pictures and provide them to the office staff to verify the condition of the Amenity Center when the rental is started in order to avoid potential deductions from the deposit amount.

# **Pet Rules for HOA Harmony**

Our association is proud to be pet-friendly, and we're happy your four-legged family members are part of our community. Of course, like any good neighbor, it's important that these pets don't create an unpleasant environment for everyone else. To avoid unnecessary disputes and potential rule violations, here are some guidelines owners should follow to ensure their furry friends continue to be a welcome addition to the neighborhood.

**Read the Rules:** While we welcome pets in our association, we have a few rules and requirements. Please check our website or the association's governing documents for more information.

Service animals are exempt from the association's pet requirements. However, please contact the board or manager to ask for an accommodation to keep a service animal. Proof of the service animal's training or a doctor's certification may be required.

**Keep it Clean:** No one wants to see, smell or accidently step in the "gift" your dog left on the grassy common area. So when your dog needs to go, be sure to properly dispose of it, preferably in a pet waste disposal can. Not only will this keep our community looking better, but it will help keep ground water clean and help prevent the spread of fecal-borne diseases.

Quiet Down: Pets will be noisy from time to time. However, when loud barking or meowing becomes annoying to neighbors, it's time to help your pet become less talkative. First, try to find out what causes your pets to get vocal: Do they get noisy when they've been alone and bored all day and need some playtime? Have they gone through a stressful change in environment recently? Are they suffering from health issues? Do they simply like saying "hello" to every squirrel, person or car that passes by? When you've identified the cause, take remedial actions such as confining them to an area where they feel calm while you're away, removing or blocking as many stimuli as possible, exercising them more and spending more time with them. You can also take them to a professional or search online for tips on how to train your pets not to get too noisy.

**No Wandering:** For the safety of your pets as well as all residents, please do not allow your pets to roam unattended outside. Along with helping protect your pets, leashing your dog is the law.

# Late Fees on Past Due Assessments

Semi-annual assessments are due on January 1st and July 1st each year. Please pay the full amount due by January 30th and July 30th respectively, or late fees will occur. Payments can be made online at ClickPay.com, the online payment provider for

FirstService Residential. Homeowners can make one-time payments or set up monthly payments through ClickPay. Payments can be made by e-check (ACH) for free, or by credit/debit card for a small processing fee. Get started by creating your account at www.ClickPay.com/FirstService.

#### Late fee schedule as follows:

**30 Days late:** \$270.00 Dues +\$25.00 1st Late fee + \$15.00 Reminder Notice = \$310

**60 Days late:** \$310 Balance + \$25.00 2nd Late fee + \$15.00 Second Notice = \$350

**90 Days late:** \$350 Balance+ \$25.00 3rd Late fee +\$80.00 Demand Letter = \$455

A late fee of \$25.00 will be applied each month until the balance exceeds \$800.00. Once the balance exceeds \$800.00, the account will be transferred to the attorney for collection and homeowner will incur substantial additional legal expenses.


## **Meet Brownie!**

# CUTE DUNNY OUT OF YOUR YARD

You spend time and money on landscaping your yard. You may have a garden of vegetables or beautiful arrays of flowers. And one little bunny rabbit can destroy all your hard work. There are a few things you can do to discourage rabbits from your garden and yard. These ideas and suggestions are not guaranteed to keep rabbits from your yard but can be a deterrent.

- You can create a barrier by planning geraniums around the perimeter of your garden and landscape. Rabbits do not like the smell of geraniums.
- This next idea may sound crazy but rabbits are repelled by the scent of humans and it is suggested that you should sprinkle some human hair between your plants and rows of flowers.
- Using a life sized plastic owl mounted on a stick above your garden will deter rabbits as well as most rodents. Owls prey on mice, rabbits and squirrels.
- A fake rubber snake positioned in and around your garden can act as a stop sign for rabbits. Rabbits hate snakes. Make sure you tell the whole family if you decide to place fake snakes around your yard as it could be unnerving to your family not just the rabbits.
- A standard chicken wire fence can also be placed

around a vegetable garden which will work although it may be a little unsightly but it will keep the rabbits out.


• And last but not least is organic product called Rabbit Scram which can be purchased on Amazon or at

that rabbits do not like the smell of geraniums or the scent of humans?

stores such as Walmart. This product repels rabbits due to an offensive scent and triggers a defense mechanism in the rabbits causing them to flee from predators. A hint to help this product work even better is to wash away or gather rabbit pellets out of your yard before applying Rabbit Scram.

Hopefully a few of these ideas will keep the rabbits hopping right past your yard.





# Calling *AFTER-HOURS*877-378-2388

After regular business hours, our management company has a very efficient emergency response system in place in order to respond to appropriate emergencies, which are situations that can cause the damage of property. You may reach out Customer Care Center after hours at 877-378-2388.

Our management company can do little about your neighbor's dog barking at 3am. We recommend calling the police non-emergency number at 817-392-1234. The best way to handle this kind of situation long term, is for you and other affected neighbors to report it in writing each time an incident occurs and submit it to the City of Fort Worth.

Prowlers and vandals are best handled by the local law enforcement officials. The quickest, most effective response and enforcement will come from the Police department.

However, if a broken common area sprinkler or irrigation timer is threatening property, the management company should be notified by calling the Customer Care Center number listed above. Our staff is on call, and will handle the emergency as soon as possible.

A rule of thumb to remember when determining whether or not to call the management company after-hours is that if the property threatening situation can be addressed by one of the Association's contractors, and if not reported immediately will cause personal or property damage, then call.

Remember, our Board of Directors and management depend on the eyes and ears of the community to make sure that all of community's needs are met. Please don't hesitate to contact management during normal business hours with any questions you may have about the after-hours policy.



# CODE BLUE CONNECTION What is Code Blue?

If you work in a hospital setting, Code Blue is the term used for an emergency. In that setting, you are directed to an area inwhich the emergency is taking place. You are then given verbal commands by physicians to start emergency treatment on a patient.

Twenty nine years ago, in 1991 the Fort Worth Police Department started the Citizens on Patrol program. It was given the moniker "Code Blue (COP) Citizens on Patrol", when Congresswoman Kay Granger was the Mayor of Fort Worth and Chief Thomas Windham was the Chief of Police. By utilizing the residents of Fort Worth (as extra eyes and ears) for the Police Department, they empowered the city to help combat the crime on the streets.

The Code Blue program began with 105 volunteer residents. Now, in North Division alone, we have 80 volunteers! North Division has one of the most active COP Groups in the City.

The volunteers send a strong message to all law enforcement that they are not alone. Because of the willingness of citizen volunteers throughout the city, we are able to

live in a more safe and secure city.

You are probably wondering how citizen volunteers can help keep our neighborhood safe. By driving around, making a presence with signs on our cars, we become deterrents. If a perpetrator is in our neighborhood and sees the signs on our cars, they are more likely to leave the area. Since we are the "eyes and ears" for FWPD,

we can watch for criminal behavior or hear if someone is calling out for help. As we drive around we become familiarized with streets, homes and vehicles. If something looks out of place we may be the first to notice.

Most people assume they don't have time to commit to a program like Code Blue. Four hours a month is all that is required to he issued a police radio/charger, signs, shirts and jackets. The

> program has more to offer than driving around in your car. We are trained to patrol, walk or ride a bike. For those who are shut-ins or just don't want to drive, the program uses volunteers

to monitor the police radio and check on the safety of each patroller. You would record a patroller going out on patrol as well as those

ending their patrol. Once an hour the monitor checks on each patroller by doing a roll-

The program has many safety features to help each patroller stay safe, in-

> cluding a direct link (on our radio) to the 911 Dispatch

operator. With the push of a button we have immediate help at our fingertips. COP members can attend a monthly meeting with the North Division Commander as well as a monthly beat meeting with our neighborhood police Officer Barry Saw-

yer. We also have a great time with all the Officers by having cook-outs, recruitment drives and even undercover special details during the summer months.

If you would like to make a difference in our neighborhood and take a stand again crime, consider joining the FWPD Code Blue Citizen on Patrol program. Classes are offered once a month rotating through all the Divisions throughout the year. We are CJIS certified, fingerprinted and have background checks.

# TYPES OF

# DEFICIENCIES

& their solutions

# NITROGEN deficiency

Yellow or pale green leaves, stunted growth.

#### SOULTION:

Add coffee grounds directly to your soil or plant nitrogen-rich plants near nitrogen-deficient plants. Common nitrogen-rich plants include beans and peas.





# PHOSPHOROUS deficiency

Darkening around edges of leaves, small or absent flowers, stunted growth.

Add bone meal directly to soil. You can also add used fish tank water to soil if it does not contain saltwater. This water is also a good source of nitrogen

# POTASSIUM deficiency

Leaves with brown spots, brown or yellow veins or yellow edges. This deficiency is more susceptible to disease and drought.

Bury banana peels an inch into your soil. Peels take a while to rot, so this is a method that will slowly help your plants. Banana peels also deter aphids



# MAGNESIUM deficiency

Yellowing of veins and edges of leaves. Can sometimes have a marbled appearance.

Add epsom salt directly to the top of your soil before you water your soil. Epsom sait is especially beneficial for tomatoes, peopers and roses.

# CALCIUM deficiency

Yellow spots between leaf veins, blossom end rot, sturted growth, weak or dying stems.

Add crushed egg shells into soil. This method will slowly help your plants, so make sure you till the egg shells well into the soil to help the process along.



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# **CLEANING YOUR CAST IRON SKILLET**



While your cast iron skillet is hot from cooking your favorite dish, place enough water to cover the bottom. Lightly scrub using a long handled dish cleaning brush to loosen any cooked on food. Turn the burner to low heat, add a tablespoon of salt to the water in the skillet, continuing to lightly scrub the bottom and sides. Remove the skillet from the heat and rinse the salty water from the skillet, with hot tap water then pat dry. The final step is to apply a small amount of oil to the bottom and sides with a paper towel. Your cast iron skillet is ready to cook again!

There are numerous benefits to cooking with a cast iron skillet. One significant benefit is that food cooked in an iron skillet absorbs iron which boosts your bodies iron intake. Studies show that many women and some men lack iron in their diet which can lead to anemia. Other benefits are durability, cast iron requires less oil, can handle high heat and food cooks more evenly.

Whether you inherited a cast iron skillet from your grandmother or purchased one yourself, either way knowing how to clean it is fundamentally necessary for continued use in order to reap the benefits of cooking in your cast iron skillet.
